

ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICE OF THE COURTS

Legal Authorization

The Administrative Office of the Courts was established by 10 Delaware Code, Chapter 1, during the 1971 General Assembly.

Duties

The Administrative Office of the Courts serves as the focal point for coordination and communication concerning all court administrative activities in the judicial system. The office prepares budgets for the Supreme Court and the Court of Chancery and assists in preparation of the budgets of the Public Guardian and the Law Libraries. It administers the payment of all jurors and witnesses. The AOC is largely responsible for the acquisition of space or facilities for the judicial system, and is responsible for the supervision of lease negotiations and the payment of all rentals. The Administrative Office has assumed a role of general supervision over and assistance to the Alderman's Courts. It has primary responsibility for the acquisition, supervision and administration of federal funds received to assist the court system. Together with the Statistical Analysis Center, the Administrative Office of the Courts is developing a computerized judicial information system. Also, the AOC acts as the focal point between the court system and other government agencies on the local, state, and federal levels.

Personnel

The Director of the Administrative Office of the Courts is appointed by and serves at the pleasure of the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of the State of Delaware.

The Director may, with the approval of the Chief Justice, appoint such assistants and clerical personnel as are required.

The staff of the Judicial Planning Committee is operationally part of the Administrative Office of the Courts.

Supreme Court

Legal Authorization

The Supreme Court was created by the Constitution of Delaware, Article IV, Section I.

Geographic Organization

The Supreme Court has statewide jurisdiction and sits in Dover.

Legal Jurisdiction

The Court has final appellate jurisdiction in criminal cases in which the penalty exceeds certain minimums and in civil cases as to final judgments and certain other orders of Superior Court, Chancery Court, and Family Court. Appeals are heard on the record. The Supreme Court has jurisdiction to issue writs of prohibition, quo warranto, certiorari, and mandamus.

Judges

The Supreme Court consists of a Chief Justice and two Associate Justices, who are appointed by the Governor on a bipartisan basis with the consent of the Senate. The Justices are appointed for 12-year terms and must be learned in the law.

Support Personnel

The Chief Justice is responsible for the administration of all courts in the state and appoints a Director of the Administrative Office of the Courts to manage the non-judicial aspects of court administration.

Caseload Trend

The number of appeals filed in the Court continues to increase. During fiscal year 1977, a total of 362 civil and criminal appeals were filed - an increase of more than 200% over the same period ten years ago. But the Court still has the same number of Justices, and staff in the office of the Clerk of the Court has not increased since 1965. The Court urgently needs 2 additional Justices, a staff attorney and a calendaring clerk in order to cope with its responsibilities under the Constitution.







10-YEAR WORKLOAD TREND CIVIL CASES





Court of Chancery

Legal Authorization

The Constitution of Delaware, Article IV, Section 1, authorizes the Court of Chancery.

Geographic Organization

The Court of Chancery holds court in Wilmington, Dover, and Georgetown, that is, at one location in each county in the county seat.

Legal Jurisdiction

The Court of Chancery has jurisdiction to hear and determine all matters and causes in equity. The general equity jurisdiction of the Court is measured in terms of the general equity jurisdiction of the High Court of Chancery of Great Britain as it existed prior to the separation of the American Colonies. The General Assembly may confer upon the Court of Chancery additional statutory jurisdiction. In today's practice, the litigation in the Court of Chancery largely consists of corporate matters, petitions concerning trusts, estates, and other fiduciary matters, disputes involving real property such as boundary and title disputes, and commercial and contractual matters. When issues of fact to be tried by jury arise, the Court of Chancery may order such facts to trial by issues at Superior Court.

Judges

There are one Chancellor and two Vice-Chancellors who hold the Court of Chancery. The Chancellor and Vice-Chancellors are appointed by the Governor with the consent of the majority of the Senate's elected members for 12 year terms. The Chancellor and Vice-Chancellors must be learned in the law.

Support Personnel

The Chancellor may appoint court reporters, bailiffs, criers of pages, and law clerks. Each of the judges may appoint one office secretary.

An elected Register in Chancery of each county is Clerk of the Court of Chancery for the county. The Judges appoint one Chief Deputy Register in Chancery in each county.

The Register of Wills acts as a Clerk of the Court of Chancery for probate matters. The majority of the Register's former judicial and quasi-judicial powers are now held by the Court of Chancery. A Register of Wills is elected in each county for the county. The Chancellor names a Chief Deputy Register of Wills for each county.

COURT OF CHANCERY (CONTINUED)

Public Guardian

The Chancellor has the duty to appoint the Public Guardian. The Public Guardian serves, when appointed by the Court, as the guardian of the person and/or property of the aged, the mentally infirm and the physically incapacitated. Under the law, the Public Guardian is intended to be the guardian of last resort.

Caseload Trend

Of the three categories of work handled by the Court of Chancery in FY 1977, two (civil cases and miscellaneous matters) experienced moderate declines in the number of filings, while the other (estates) experienced a slight increase. The number of statewide civil cases filed declined from 408 to 368, a 9.8% drop. The number of miscellaneous matters filed in Delaware during FY 1977 was 536, a decline of 13.8% from the previous year's total of 622. The number of estates opened increased from 1,634 in FY 1976 to 1,700 in FY 1977, a 4.0% upward change.









Public Guardian

THE PUBLIC GUARDIAN

Legal Authorization

The authority for the Office of the Public Guardian is derived from Title 12, §3991, of the Delaware Code:

"There is established the Office of the Public Guardian. The Chancellor shall appoint the Public Guardian, who shall serve at his pleasure. The salary of the Public Guardian shall be \$18,500.00 per annum, to be paid from the General Fund. The Chancellor, in his discretion, may require the Public Guardian to post bond.

Geographic Organization

The Office of the Public Guardian has responsibility for the entire state and presents its petitions for guardianships in the Court of Chancery in all three counties.

Legal Jurisdiction

The powers and duties of the Public Guardian are spelled out in Title 12, §3992, of the Delaware Code:

"The Public Guardian, when appointed as guardian by Court Order, shall:

- Serve as guardian for the property of aged, mentally infirm or physically incapacitated persons, pursuant to §3914 of this Title;
- 2. Serve as a guardian for the person of aged, mentally infirm or physically incapacitated persons where such persons are in danger of substantially endangering their health, or of becoming subject to abuse by other persons, or of becoming the victim of designing persons; or,
- 3. Serve as both guardian of the person and of property of such person."

The intent of the legislation creating the Office of the Public Guardian was to create a guardianship capability for those situations in which a person needing a guardian does not have any relative, friend or other person interested in or capable of serving as a guardian, whose estate is insufficient to purchase the services of a private guardian, or who would be best served by a neutral guardian.

Personnel

The Public Guardian is assisted by an Administrative Assistant and a Secretary.

Caseload

In the year of operation July 1, 1976 to June 30, 1977, the office received 80 referrals, of which 50 were from New Castle County,

16 from Kent, and 14 from Sussex. This total of 80 new referrals represents a slight decline from the total of 94 referrals in FY 1976. Of this number, 15 were determined to need the services of the Public Guardian as a guardian, and petitions were presented in the appropriate counties. As of June 30, 1977, the Public Guardian had responsibility for a total of 35 wards.

The remaining 65 cases were determined not to need guardianship for the solution of their problems and were served by mobilizing the resources of other state and private agencies to aid the client, involving the family of the client, helping the client to take some voluntary action on his own behalf, or simply offering counselling to help the client solve his own provlems.

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Superior Court

Legal Authorization

The Constitution of Delaware, Article IV, Section 1, created the Superior Court.

Geographic Organization

Sessions of Superior Court are held in each of the three counties at the county seat.

Legal Jurisdiction

This court has statewide original jurisdiction over criminal and civil causes, except equity causes, over which the Court of Chancery has exclusive jurisdiction. On November 21, 1975, divorce jurisdiction was transferred from Superior Court to the Family Court. The Court has exclusive jurisdiction over felonies and drug offenses (excepting most felonies and drug offenses involving minors) and jurisdiction over adoptions and terminations of parental rights. The Superior Court hears appeals on the law from the Court of Common Pleas, the Unemployment and Industrial Accident Boards, the Liquor Commission, the Zoning and Adjustment Boards, and other quasi-judicial bodies. Appeals from Alderman's Courts, Justice of the Peace Courts, and Municipal Court are heard as second trials (trials de novo) in this Court. Appeals from Superior Court are argued on the record in the Supreme Court.

Judges

Number: There are eleven judges appointed to the Superior Court bench; one is appointed President Judge with administrative responsibility for the Court, and three are appointed as Resident Judges and must reside in the county in which they are appointed.

Appointment: The Governor appoints Superior Court Judges with the consent of the Senate.

Tenure: The judges are appointed for 12-year terms.

Qualifications: The judges must be learned in the law and must be members of the Delaware Bar.

Support Personnel

The Superior Court may appoint court reporters, law clerks, bailiffs, presentence officers, a secretary for each judge, and other personnel.

SUPERIOR COURT (CONTINUED)

An elected Prothonotary for each county serves as Clerk of Superior Court for that county. The Prothonotary is the recordkeeper for Superior Court, and as such, the Prothonotary is directly involved with the civil court calendar. The office also handles the jury list, court exhibits, property liens, registration of law students and attorneys, and is the custodian of fees for the courts and for the Attorney General. Functions of the Prothonotary's office are divided as follows: Civil, Criminal, Indexing and Entry of Judgments and Executions, Administrative, Terminations and Adoptions. Further, the Prothonotary's office is charged with the security, care and custody of Court's exhibits.

Elected Sheriffs, one per county, also serve Superior Court.

Caseload Trend

In September, 1975, Superior Court assumed control of the criminal calendar, which had formerly been handled by the Attorney General. The Criminal Case Scheduling Office was established to handle the criminal calendar in conjunction with the Criminal Office Judge.

During FY 1977 Superior Court changed its policy of holding periodic criminal case "Blitz" periods to deal with the backlog of pending criminal defendants in New Castle County to one of regularly assigning 5 of the county's 8 judges to criminal matters and 3 to civil matters. The success of this policy, together with the efforts of the Scheduling Office, enabled the court in FY 1977 to dispose of 73.8% of the defendants before it within 120 days of arrest, the time interval specified by the Chief Justice's Speedy Trial Directive. In each of the last 2 months of the fiscal year, compliance exceeded 84%. These success rates were achieved while Superior Court experienced an 8.2% rise in the number of filings. Projections indicate that the court will continue to experience increases in criminal filings over the next several years.

However, Superior Court's emphasis on criminal cases has continued to handicap its efforts in its civil jurisdiction. Despite the loss of divorce jurisdiction, and despite increasing dispositions by one quarter in the civil action categories other than divorces, the number of civil actions pending adjudication increased by 6%. Excluding divorces, the court's workload rose by 7.3%. The new category of Involuntary Commitments particularly provided new cases, with a sixfold increase in filings over the previous year. Projections again show that the number of civil filings in the court's present jurisdiction will continue to rise.

FISCAL YEAR 1977 CRIMINAL FILINGS EXPLANATORY NOTES

- 1. All figures represent numbers of defendants only; they should not be confused with numbers of indictments, numbers of cases, criminal action numbers, or any other such figures.
- 2. A defendant is defined as an individual named in an indictment, so that an individual named in three indictments would be three defendants. An individual with a consecutively-numbered series of informations, appeals, or transfers filed on the same day would be counted as one defendant.
- 3. In Kent County only, each charge indicted against each defendant is returned as a separate indictment. Due to this practice, each person indicted at a Grand Jury session is counted as one defendant, no matter how many charges are indicted against that defendant, and without regard to later actions of the Attorney General which lead to separate trials.
- 4. Informations represent defendants who have waived indictment.
- 5. Transfers are defendants brought before the Court of Common Pleas in New Castle County who request jury trials. Since the Court of Common Pleas in Kent and Sussex Counties holds jury trials itself, there are no transfers in those two counties.
- 6. Although New Informations are given separate criminal action numbers by Superior Court, they are not counted in these figures since they represent amendments to charges facing defendants already pending before the court, not new defendants. Inclusion of New Informations as filings would artificially inflate the number of defendants filed in any time period.
- 7. Reinstatements represent defendants who have had their cases disposed of who are brought back before Superior Court for one of the following reasons:
 - -Mistrial
 - -Hung Jury
 - -Motion for new trial granted
 - -Guilty plea withdrawn
 - -Nolle prosequi withdrawn
 - -Lower court appeal reinstated after being dismissed
 - -Conviction overturned by Supreme Court; remanded to Superior Court for new trial

FISCAL YEAR 1977 CRIMINAL DISPOSITIONS EXPLANATORY NOTES

- 1. All figures represent numbers of defendants only; they should not be confused with numbers of cases, criminal action numbers, or any other such figures.
- 2. A defendant is defined as an individual named in an indictment, so that an individual named in three indictments would be three defendants. An individual with a consecutively-numbered series or informations, appeals, or transfers filed on the same day would be counted as one defendant.
- 3. The trial dispositions refer to the number of defendants whose charges were disposed of at a trial, not the number of trials per se. The date of disposition is the trial date, unless the decision is reserved, in which case it is the date when the opinion is handed down.
- 4. A defendant is counted as being disposed of by nolle prosequi only if all charges in an indictment or information or all charges transferred or appealed simultaneously are dropped. If a defendant pleads to one charge in an indictment, and other charges in the same indictment are then nol-prossed, that defendant is considered to have been disposed of by guilty plea, and his disposition date is the date of the plea.
- 5. Defendants are not counted as disposed of by nol-pros if the nolle prosequi was filed to an original charge because the defendant entered a guilty plea to a New Information. Since the New Information represents essentially a further action in an existing case and is not counted as a separate filing, so also the nol-pros is not the primary disposition. Counting a defendant as nol-prossed and as having entered a plea to a new information would mean counting two dispositions for one case.
- 6. Only nol-prosses filed for defendants who were actually brought before Superior Court by indictment, information, appeal, transfer, or reinstatement are counted in the total number of Superior Court dispositions. Nolle prosequis of unindicted defendants are listed separately because such defendants were never formally before the Superior Court. Counting them as dispositions would be erroneously counting dispositions for cases which were never filed.

EXPLANATORY NOTES CONTINUED

- 7. Remands are defendants who appealed or transferred their cases to Superior Court and had them remanded back to lower court.
- 8. ADRR's and remands do not constitute the dispositions of all appeals that are filed; some are disposed of by trial de novo, plea, or nolle prosequi.
- 9. During FY 1977, all "Other" dispositions were appeals withdrawn by the defendant.
- 10. Unindicted nolle prosequis are felony or drug defendants who were arrested but never brought before the grand jury for indictment or whose indictments were 'ignored by the grand jury.

- 1. "PG-All" means that the defendant pled guilty to every charge facing him. These pleas of guilty are the only ones not pleabargained.
- 2. "PG-Most Serious" indicates that the defendant pled guilty to the major charge of a multi-count indictment, appeal, transfer, or reinstatement.
- 3. "PG-LIO" denotes that a defendant pled guilty to a lesser included offense of the most serious charge.
- 4. "PG-Lesser" indicates a plea of guilty to a lesser charge of the same indictment or other filing.
- 5. "PG-LIO-Lesser" means that the defendant pled guilty to a lesser included offense of a lesser charge of a multi-count indictment or other filing. This is the weakest type of plea.
- 6. "PG-NI" indicates that a defendant pled guilty to a new information always a less serious charge than the original one.
- 7. "PG-Information" denotes a defendant who waived indictment and pled guilty to an information filed by the Attorney General. This is always a reduced charge.
- 8. Pleas of guilty to amended informations (PG-AI) were counted in with the PG-LIO's.
- 9. A plea of nolo contendere was considered to be the equivalent of a guilty plea, e.g., a plea of Nolo Contendere to an LIO was counted in with the PG-LIO's.





FISCAL YEAR 1977 CRIMINAL JUDGE TIME UTILIZATION EXPLANATORY NOTES

- 1. Judge Days Assigned to criminal trial work are arrived at as follows. One judge is assigned to be Criminal Office Judge and one to be Civil Office Judge; they manage their respective calendars and do not hear cirminal trials. No trials are assigned to Fridays, which are used for arraignments, motions, sentencings, and civil miscellaneous matters by all judges. Vacation days and holidays are removed from the schedule. The remaining time is trial time, approximately 65% of which is assigned to the criminal calendar, and 35% to the civil calendar.
- 2. Trial time is computed in ½ day increments, with the luncheon recess considered to be the dividing point.
- 3. When more than 100% of assigned time is used, the extra time is found in one or more of three ways: 1) using the Criminal Office Judge to try criminal cases, 2) using Fridays to try criminal cases, or 3) transferring judges from the civil to the criminal calendar.
- 4. For FY 1977, only Criminal Judge Time Utilization was available. Beginning in FY 1978, Civil Judge Time Utilization is being calculated as well.

FISCAL YEAR 1977 PERFORMANCE ANALYSIS EXPLANATORY NOTES

- 1. The Speedy Trial Directive of Chief Justice Daniel L. Herrmann states that all criminal defendants brought before Superior Court must be tried within 120 days of arrest.
- 2. The Elapsed Time charts measure the average and median time intervals between arrest and disposition, and the average and median time intervals between indictment and disposition. Since Superior Court cases do not all originate by indictment, it is not possible to subtract the figures for indictment to disposition from the figures for arrest to disposition to determine pre-indictment time intervals.
- 3. In measuring the elapsed time of defendants for the purposes of computing compliance with speedy directives or average elapsed time, Superior Court <u>excludes</u> the following time intervals:
 - a. For all capiases, the time between the date the capias is issued and the date the capias is executed.
 - b. In the case of arraignment capiases, the interval between the execution of the capias and arraignment.
 - c. In the case of trial capiases, the time between execution of the capias and the first scheduled trial date.
 - d. For all Rule 9 Summonses and Rule 9 Warrants, the time between arrest and indictment, if any.
 - e. In the case of Rule 9 Warrants, the interval between indictment and arrest.
 - f. In the case of Rule 9 Summonses which are superseded by Rule 9 Warrants, the full interval between indictment and arrest.
 - g. For all nolle prosequis, all time between the scheduled trial date and the actual filing date of the nolle prosequi.







Law Libraries

There are three Law Libraries located in the State of Delaware. They are staffed and maintained by state funds and each is presided over by a Law Librarian. The libraries are named after the counties in which they are situated.

The primary function of the Law Libraries is to provide a legal information center for the Judiciary, Public Defender's Office, legal representatives of county and municipalities, city solicitors, and members of the Delaware Bar. They are also the official depositories for state laws, administrative regulations, and court rules. The libraries are made available to registered law students to assist them in preparation for state bar examinations and in their legal education. All three libraries are designated as official depository libraries by the U.S. Government Printing Office. As state-supported agencies the libraries are available to the general public during normal working hours. Aid and assistance is rendered to persons wishing to make use of the facilities.

The New Castle County Law Library, located in the Public Building, Wilmington, Delaware, is the busiest of the three libraries. It houses in excess of 19,000 books and there is presently seated working space for 26 persons at one time. In 1975, this library was enlarged in size by taking over space formally occupied by the Department of Justice. Shelving and carpeting were recently installed in the newly acquired space and it is hoped that the older section will conform with the new in decor. Even with this newly acquired space, the facilities will become inadequate within a year unless additional space, shelving, tables, and charis are provided. Books are still stored in the Judges' quarters due to lack of storage space. The entire facility is maintained and administered by one full-time Law Librarian and one part-time assistant.

The Kent County Law Library, due to its location, is designated as the State Library. It houses the largest legal library maintained by the state and is staffed by one full-time librarian and one part-time assistant.

The Sussex County Law Library is staffed by one Law Librarian and houses approximately 12,000 volumes.

The Law Librarians are responsible for administrative library work as well as maintaining the bookkeeping records required by the These duties and responsiblities include but are not limited to the following: insertion of pocket parts, maintenance of loose leaf services, bookkeeping for the agency's accounts, preparing invoices for library expenditures, filing and indexing reported and unreported opinions from the several courts, obtaining and filing copies of rules and regulations promulgated by the governmental agencies, maintaining of books and their monetary values, obtaining and filing statutes from the legislative council and other states, handling requests from various persons for information contained in the library, handling special requests for research work from the judges, planning and recommending development and improvement of services, writing reports, and in general performing duties associated with library work.

Family Court

FAMILY COURT

Legal Authorization

The Family Court Act, Title 10, Chapter 9, Delaware Code, authorizes the Family Court.

Geographic Organization

The Family Court is a unified statewide Court with branches in New Castle County at Wilmington, Kent County at Dover, and Sussex County at Georgetown.

Legal Jurisdiction

The Family Court has broad civil and criminal jurisdiction over domestic relations matters and over juveniles (persons under 18 years of age) who are dependent, neglected, or delinquent.

Domestic relations jurisdiction includes divorces and annulments, property settlements, separate maintenance of spouses, custody and visitation of children, non-support of dependents, and actions involving family discord.

Matters heard in the interest of a child include neglect, abuse, abandonment, and contributing to the delinquency of a minor, and juvenile delinquency.

The Family Court does not have jurisdiction over adults charged with felonies nor juveniles charged with first degree murder, rape, and kidnapping.

Appeals are made de novo to Superior Court, except divorce and contractual support agreements, which are appealed on the record to the Supreme Court.

Number: There are 11 judges of equal judicial authority; one is appointed Chief Judge with administrative responsibility for the Court, and the remaining 10 are Associate Judges.

Appointment: The Governor appoints Family Court judges with the consent of the Senate.

Tenure: The judges are appointed for 12-year terms.

Qualifications: Judges must have been duly admitted to the practice of law before the Supreme Court of Delaware at least five years prior to appointment and must have a knowledge of the law and interest in and understanding of family and child problems. They shall not practice law during their tenure and may be reappointed.

Other Judicial Personnel

The Chief Judge appoints and commissions suitable persons, who must have resided in the State for at least five years prior to appointment, to act as masters in the Court. Masters may hear any matter properly before them, and their decisions become judgments of the Court unless disapproved by a judge. Parties may request a review de novo by a judge, by petitioning in writing within 15 days of the master's decision.

Support Personnel

The Family Court employs a staff of approximately 190 persons in addition to the judiciary. The staff includes clerks of court, judicial secretaries, counselors, accounting personnel, clerks, clerk-typists, bailiffs, and process servers.

Caseload Trend

The method of collecting statistics was modified in New Castle County beginning January 1, 1977, but was continued as previously in Kent and Sussex Counties. Therefore, an exact comparison of the caseloads in Fiscal Years 1976 and 1977 cannot be made. However, a statistical estimate indicates that the caseload statewide increased by approximately 12 percent in 1977 over the previous year.

Overall, there were increases in juvenile delinquency and adult criminal informations and decreases in civil petitions.

Over the past five years, the Court's caseload has increased over 100 percent while the number of personnel to deal with those cases has increased by only 16 percent.





Court of Common Pleas

Legal Authorization

The statewide Court of Common Pleas was created by 10 Delaware Code, Chapters 13, 15, and 16, effective July 5, 1973.

Geographic Organization

The Court of Common Pleas sits in each of the three counties at the respective county seats.

Legal Jurisdiction

The Court of Common Pleas has statewide jurisdiction which includes concurrent jurisdiction with Superior Court in civil actions where the amount involved, exclusive of interest, does not exceed \$5,000 on the complaint. There is no limitation in amount on counterclaim. All civil cases are tried without a jury.

The Court has criminal jurisdiction over all misdemeanors occurring in the State of Delaware except drug-related cases and those occurring within corporate limits of the City of Wilmington. Jury trial is available to all defendants but in New Castle County jury trials are referred to Superior Court for disposition.

Appeals from the Court of Common Pleas are taken on the record to Superior Court.

Judges

There are five Judges of the Court of Common Pleas, one Chief Judge and four Resident Judges. The Judges are appointed by the Governor with the consent of the Senate for 12 year terms and must have been actively engaged in the general practice of law in the State of Delaware for at least five years. No more than a majority of one judge may be from the same political party.

Support Personnel

The Chief Judge of the Court of Common Pleas may appoint clerks, bailiffs, court reporters, and secretaries.

Caseload Trend

The number of civil and criminal cases filed in the Court continues to rise as it has year after year. During FY 1977 the increase in criminal actions filed was 11.9% in New Castle County, 6.7% in Kent County, and 3.6% in Sussex County. The increase in civil actions filed was 10.6% in New Castle County and 14.1% in Kent County, and for the first time there was a reduction of 42.3% in the number of civil cases filed in Sussex County. This is indeed an unusual event and has not happened before and by all appearances will not reoccur. The Court has been successful in keeping current

in disposition of the cases and prides itself in the absence of a "backlog". The help problem has been resolved for the moment and the problem of the limitation of space is in the process of being solved. Once the additional space has been properly renovated the immediate problems of the Court will have been met.


5-YEAR WORKLOAD PROJECTIONS CIVIL CASES

MUNICIPAL COURT

Legal Authorization

This court is authorized by 10 Delaware Code, Section 1701.

Geographic Organization

This court has jurisdiction within the geographic boundaries of Wilmington.

Legal Jurisdiction

Municipal Court has criminal jurisdiction over traffic, misdemeanor, and municipal ordinances concurrent with the Justices of the Peace and the Court of Common Pleas. The Court conducts preliminary hearings for both felonies and drug-related misdemeanors. Jury trials are not available. The court has a Violations Division which processes all moving and parking citations.

Judges

Number - There are 3 Judges of the Municipal Court of Wilmington.

Appointment - The Judges are appointed by the Governor, with approval by the Senate.

Tenure - Judges are appointed for 12 year terms.

Qualifications - The Judges must be licensed to practice
law in the State of Delaware for 5 years
preceding appointment.

Support Personnel

The Senior Judge of the Municipal Court appoints a Chief Clerk who may in turn appoint Deputies.

Caseload Trend

The Municipal Court caseload exceeded 9,000 criminal cases for the first time. This has kept the personnel of the Court working at maximum capacity to meet the demands of a constant flow of criminal cases. Two public defenders, four court commissioners, several prosecutors, and the three judges have barely kept pace with this workload. The record of 9,435 dispositions during the year permitted the Court to meet the stringent demands of processing misdemeanors and Superior Court Rule 5 committing magistrate requirements.

The activity of the court personnel is only partially reflected in these statistics. The court commissioners - working 24 hours of every day - in fact process far more than the final criminal case statistic. The commissioners process an average of 100 Family Court complaints monthly as well as rejecting a substantial number of cases for lacking probable cause. The increasing demand in time required by judges, commissioners, and staff may require increasing the number of each to handle these new demands.

The steady escalation of traffic offenses appears to have stabilized in recent years. This, added to the burden of processing the City of Wilmington parking citations, occupies a substantial amount of time of court personnel.





Court of Common Pleas

Legal Authorization

The statewide Court of Common Pleas was created by 10 Delaware Code, Chapters 13, 15, and 16, effective July 5, 1973.

Geographic Organization

The Court of Common Pleas sits in each of the three counties at the respective county seats.

Legal Jurisdiction

The Court of Common Pleas has statewide jurisdiction which includes concurrent jurisdiction with Superior Court in civil actions where the amount involved, exclusive of interest, does not exceed \$5,000 on the complaint. There is no limitation in amount on counterclaim. All civil cases are tried without a jury.

The Court has criminal jurisdiction over all misdemeanors occurring in the State of Delaware except drug-related cases and those occurring within corporate limits of the City of Wilmington. Jury trial is available to all defendants but in New Castle County jury trials are referred to Superior Court for disposition.

Appeals from the Court of Common Pleas are taken on the record to Superior Court.

Judges

There are five Judges of the Court of Common Pleas, one Chief Judge and four Resident Judges. The Judges are appointed by the Governor with the consent of the Senate for 12 year terms and must have been actively engaged in the general practice of law in the State of Delaware for at least five years. No more than a majority of one judge may be from the same political party.

Support Personnel

The Chief Judge of the Court of Common Pleas may appoint clerks, bailiffs, court reporters, and secretaries.

Caseload Trend

The number of civil and criminal cases filed in the Court continues to rise as it has year after year. During FY 1977 the increase in criminal actions filed was 11.9% in New Castle County, 6.7% in Kent County, and 3.6% in Sussex County. The increase in civil actions filed was 10.6% in New Castle County and 14.1% in Kent County, and for the first time there was a reduction of 42.3% in the number of civil cases filed in Sussex County. This is indeed an unusual event and has not happened before and by all appearances will not reoccur. The Court has been successful in keeping current

in disposition of the cases and prides itself in the absence of a "backlog". The help problem has been resolved for the moment and the problem of the limitation of space is in the process of being solved. Once the additional space has been properly renovated the immediate problems of the Court will have been met.



Appointment - The Judges are appointed by the Governor, with approval by the Senate.

Tenure - Judges are appointed for 12 year terms.

Qualifications - The Judges must be licensed to practice
law in the State of Delaware for 5 years
preceding appointment.

Support Personnel

The Senior Judge of the Municipal Court appoints a Chief Clerk who may in turn appoint Deputies.

Caseload Trend

The Municipal Court caseload exceeded 9,000 criminal cases for the first time. This has kept the personnel of the Court working at maximum capacity to meet the demands of a constant flow of criminal cases. Two public defenders, four court commissioners, several prosecutors, and the three judges have barely kept pace with this workload. The record of 9,435 dispositions during the year permitted the Court to meet the stringent demands of processing misdemeanors and Superior Court Rule 5 committing magistrate requirements.

The activity of the court personnel is only partially reflected in these statistics. The court commissioners - working 24 hours of every day - in fact process far more than the final criminal case statistic. The commissioners process an average of 100 Family Court complaints monthly as well as rejecting a substantial number of cases for lacking probable cause. The increasing demand in time required by judges, commissioners, and staff may require increasing the number of each to handle these new demands.

The steady escalation of traffic offenses appears to have stabilized in recent years. This, added to the burden of processing the City of Wilmington parking citations, occupies a substantial amount of time of court personnel.






10-YEAR WORKLOAD TREND





JUSTICE OF THE PEACE COURTS

Legal Authorization

These Courts are authorized by the Constitution of Delaware, Article IV, Section I.

Geographic Organization

The jurisdiction of the Courts is statewide and sessions are held throughout the state. 15 Courts are operating: 7 in New Castle County, 3 in Kent County, and 5 in Sussex County.

Legal Jurisdiction

The Justice of the Peace Courts have jurisdiction over civil cases in which the amount in controversy does not exceed \$1,500. In all Justice of the Peace Courts except 2 in New Castle County, criminal jurisdiction is exercised. These Courts are authorized to hear minor misdemeanors and motor vehicle cases (excluding felonies) and may act as committing magistrates for all crimes. Since Justice of the Peace Courts are not courts of record, appeals may be taken de novo to Superior Court. The subject matter jurisdiction of the Justice of the Peace Courts is shared with the Court of Common Pleas.

Judges

There are 53 magistrates authorized. Magistrates are appointed by the Governor with Senate approval for four-year terms. A Justice of the Peace must be at least 21 years of age and a resident of the State of Delaware and the county where he serves.

Support Personnel


A Deputy Administrator for the Justice of the Peace Courts is appointed by the Governor with Senate approval. The Chief Justice of the Supreme Court is the nominal Administrator. Two Assistant Deputy Administrators serve the Deputy. The state provides chief clerks, deputy clerks, constables, and bailiffs for each court.

Caseload Trend

Criminal cases filed in the Justice of the Peace Courts have increased for many and varied reasons, reaching an all-time high of over 95,000 during FY 1977. First, police apprehending capabilities have been increased by additional financial resources from federal funds. Second, all police forces, particularly the New Castle County Police, have increased the number of policemen who are now patrolling the streets. Thus, more arrests are made. Third, the level of competency amoung the Justices of the Peace has dramatically increased, and the service provided by this advantage has correspondingly increased. Therefore, more individuals are utilizing the Justices of the Peace in order to expeditiously dispose of their cases.

JUSTICE OF THE PEACE COURTS (CONTINUED)

Civil cases have increased, reaching a similar all-time high of over 14,000 cases filed during FY 1977. It should be noted that the Justice of the Peace Courts offer plaintiffs an inexpensive forum for litigating their minor legal matters. More litigants are also due to the increase of population within the counties, and this is particularly true in the landlord/tenant situation. Total criminal and civil filings combined reached a total of 110,602 cases during FY 1977, an increase of 11.6% over FY 1976 and an increase of 44.9% over just 3 years ago.






10-YEAR WORKLOAD TREND CIVIL CASES





Alderman's Courts

ALDERMAN'S COURTS

Legal Authorization

Alderman's Courts are authorized by the town charters of their respective towns.

Geographic Organization

Alderman's Courts have jurisdiction within their own town limits only. There are 14 Alderman's Courts currently active, plus another 3 courts which were not active during FY 1977 but which have been active in the recent past. When a town is without a court or an alderman for any period of time, its cases are transferred to the nearest Justice of the Peace Court.

Legal Jurisdiction


The jurisdiction of an Alderman's Court is limited to minor misdemeanors, traffic offenses, parking violations, and minor civil matters. The specific jurisdiction of each court again varies with the town charter (which is approved by the state legislature). Many courts handle only traffic and parking violations; only 4 handle a high number of criminal cases. Harrington's court handles primarily civil cases. Appeals are taken de novo to Superior Court within 15 days of the trial.

Aldermen

The selection, number, tenure, and qualifications of aldermen are determined by the towns themselves. Some require lawyers; others choose ordinary citizens. A few Aldermen serve full-time, but most are part-time judges. In New Castle the mayor serves as judge of their court.

Caseload Trend

FY 1977 was the second year during which complete workload statistics were collected. The number of active courts remained the same as Delmar's court became active while Milton's became defunct. Of the 13 courts active in both FY 1976 and FY 1977, 8 experienced increases ranging from 5% to 243%, while 5 courts declined by amounts from 2% to 41%. Overall, the total number of cases heard by aldermen in Delaware rose by over 1,000 - a 7.6% increase. One fact continues to be evident - most Sussex County courts have extremely seasonal fluctuations in their caseloads.





Conferences, Committees, Councils, and Boards

JUDICIAL CONFERENCE

Legal Authorization

The Judicial Conference is authorized by Supreme Court Rule 35.

Duties

The Judicial Conference studies the judicial business of the courts with a view of improving the administration of justice in the State. The Conference also considers improvements in procedure, considers and recommends legislation, considers and implements the canons of judicial ethics, and holds symposia of the Bench and Bar.

Membership

The membership of the Conference includes the members of the Supreme Court, Court of Chancery, Superior Court, Court of Common Pleas, Family Court and the Municipal Court of Wilmington. The Chief Justice is presiding officer of the Conference. The Director of the Administrative Office of the Courts serves as secretary for the Conference. Stated meetings of the Conference are held on the first Wednesday of December and June.

JUDICIAL PLANNING COMMITTEE

Legal Authorization

The Judicial Planning Committee (JPC) was created by Chief Justice Daniel L. Herrmann on December 20, 1976. Authorization for the expenditure of federal funds to support planning activities of the JPC is contained in Section 203(c) of Public Law 94-503, "The Crime Control Act of 1976."

Duties

The Judicial Planning Committee is charged with coordinating all requests for federal funds from the various courts to the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration. To this end, the JPC prepares an Annual Judicial Plan for the expenditure of such funds, and provides assistance in designing programs and preparing grant applications.

The Judicial Planning Committee's Advisory Subcommittee on Computerization has assumed the role of supervising and coordinating the ongoing computerization efforts of Delaware's court system.

Membership

Membership of the Judicial Planning Committee is appointed by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, and includes judges from all the state courts plus the Attorney General and a representative from the Public Defender's Office. Current membership is as follows:

Support Personnel

A Director of Planning is appointed by and serves at the pleasure of the Judicial Planning Committee. The Planner may, with the approval of the Chairman, appoint such other personnel as are necessary.

COUNCIL ON THE ADMINISTRATION OF JUSTICE

Legal Authorization

The Council on the Administration of Justice is authorized by 10 Delaware Code, §2001-2008.

Duties

The Council is charged with the continuous study of the administration of justice in the state, and of the organization, procedure, practice, rules, and methods of administration and operation of each and all the courts of the state, whether of record or not of record. The Council collects and uses statistical and other information concerning the work of the courts and makes recommendations to the Governor, the General Assembly, the courts, or the bar.

Membership

There are 15 members including the Chief Justice, the Chancellor, the President Judge of Superior Court, the Speaker of the House, the President Pro Tem of the Senate, the Minority Leaders of the House and Senate, the Attorney General, the President of the Bar Association, the President of the University of Delaware, and five non-lawyers appointed by the Governor for a term coextensive with that of the appointing Governor. COURT ON THE JUDICIARY

Article 4, Section 37, of the Constitution of the State of Delaware created this Court, consisting of the Chief Justice and the Associate Justices of the Supreme Court, the Chancellor, and the President Judge of the Superior Court.

Any judicial officer appointed by the Governor may be censured, removed, or retired by the Court on the Judiciary for willful misconduct in office, willful and persistent failure to perform duties, for commission of an offense involving moral turpitude, other misconduct in violation of the Canons of Judicial Ethics, or for permanent mental or physical disability interfering with the proper performance of these duties.

No censure, removal, or retirement will be effective until the judicial officer has been served with written charges and has had the opportunity to be heard in accordance with due process of law.

The Court on the Judiciary has the power to:

- (a) summon witnesses to appear and testify under oath and to compel production of other evidence, and
- (b) adopt rules establishing procedures for the investigation and trial of a judicial officer.

Funds for the Court to operate are included in the budget of the Administrative Office of the Courts. If no trials are necessary, all funds will revert to the State at the end of each fiscal year. Projects

PROJECTS SUPPORTED BY FEDERAL FUNDS

During the past fiscal year, Delaware Courts received continued support in the effort to improve the Criminal Justice System from the Governor's Commission on Criminal Justice (GCCJ), which is the State Criminal Justice Planning Agency (SPA) that administers the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration (LEAA) block grant allocation.

GCCJ subgrant funds were expended for the following purposes:

- 1. To employ a Courts Data Analyst. This was a continuation of a subgrant which provided the services of a person to support the Director of The Administrative Office of the Courts and the Courts Consortium Planner in their varied duties. The Courts Data Analyst was primarily responsible for the development of the Annual Report of the Delaware Judiciary.
- 2. To employ a Detentioner Reporter. This was a continuation of a subgrant which provided a person to collect data and produce reports on detentioners and prisoners awaiting criminal trial.
- 3. To provide Training for Supervisory Personnel. This was a subgrant which provided the wherewithal to offer key supervisory personnel working in the judiciary training which was intended to improve their skills and enhance their performance as mid-level managers.
- 4. To offer an In-State Criminal Law Seminar. This subgrant has provided funds to enable the American Bar Association Standards and Goals Implementation Committee to develop materials and conduct a seminar on the ABA Standards and Goals. This seminar will focus upon new court rules and rule changes in the various State courts.
- 5. To provide Magistrates with Continuing Education. This subgrant provided orientation for newly appointed magistrates and on-going education for all Judges of the Justice of the Peace Courts. This program was administered by the Delaware Law School.
- 6. To provide Personnel for the Presentence Office. This subgrant enabled the Superior Court Presentence Office to continue to employ a Presentence Officer and 3 clerk typists to respond to the increasing demand for the timely production of presentence reports.
- 7. To employ an Administrative Assistant to the Criminal Office Judge. This subgrant enabled Superior Court to continue to employ an Administrative Assistant whose primary responsibilities were to provide the Criminal Office Judge with the means to coordinate the efforts of the Case Scheduling Office with the available Judges and Courtrooms and to provide information to assist in "pre-trying" complex criminal trials.

PROJECTS SUPPORTED BY FEDERAL FUNDS (CONTINUED)

- 8. To employ a Coordinator of Referral Services. This subgrant enabled the Family Court to continue to employ a person to refer juveniles charged for the first time with a minor crime to non-correctional facilities.
- 9. To implement a File Room Project. This subgrant enabled Family Court to hire and assign one clerk to incoming cases in New Castle County to separate the legal records from the social records. This person also prepared individual records on new cases.
- 10. To provide Training and Resources. This subgrant provided sixteen training sessions for the Family Court counseling staff and resulted in the purchase of books for the three court libraries.
- 11. To maintain the Detentioner Project. This subgrant enabled the Family Court to continue to employ 4 persons who supervised juveniles in the Court Detention Center while awaiting a hearing and screened Bridgehouse detainees for possible release to their families prior to Court hearing.
- 12. To provide Supplemental Support Personnel. This subgrant provided a process server and a law clerk to assist the Municipal Court with Administrative and Legal assistance.
- 13. To provide Support Personnel. This subgrant continued to provide a process server to assist the Municipal Court. In addition, a Court Coordinator was also hired whose primary responsibility was to reduce the number of continuances in bringing cases to trial.
- 14. To provide a Case Coordinator. This subgrant enabled the Municipal Court to continue to employ the Case Coordinator whose primary duty has been described above.

Other federally funded programs were as follows:

- 1. Delaware Justice Information System DELJIS

 Two systems analysts have been assigned to work with the Courts in the development of the Courts Module of the overall DELJIS Program. One analyst is dedicated to the information system for family and juvenile matters and is assigned to Family Court; the second analyst is working on the information system for adult matters (criminal and civil) and is assigned to the Administrative Office of the Courts. The current design work is federally funded from LEAA under the Offender Based Transaction Statistics/Computerized Criminal Histories (OBTS/CCH) component of the Comprehensive Date Systems (CDS) Program.
- 2. <u>Judicial Planning Committee</u>
 The Judicial Planning Committee of Delaware (JPC) was created

Bifferato to serve as In addition, Judges from each of the various courts were appointed along with the Attorney General, a representative of the Public Defender's Office, and the Director of the Administrative Office of the Courts. The mission of the JPC is to plan for the improvement of the Delaware Courts which includes planning for the utilization of limited federal block grant monies received through the Governor's Commission on The Reauthorization Criminal Justice which are provided by LEAA. Act provides \$50,000 annually to each participating State for the purpose of employing a professional planning staff who must produce an Annual Judicial Plan and meet whatever additional federal requirements that exist in order to ensure compliance with the Act.

Court Rules Changes

COURT RULES CHANGES

The following additions, deletions, or amendments were made to the rules of Delaware's courts during FY 1977. This material represents a synopsis of the changes, rather than verbatim copies of the rules themselves. The changes listed are those whose effective dates were between July 1, 1976 and June 30, 1977.

Supreme Court

RULE 10B

Effective 1-7-77, a public officer or state employee named as a defendant in an action brought before the Delaware Supreme Court or the United States District Court for conduct arising from his employment with the state may petition for the appointment of counsel. The petition is to be verified by the petitioner and must state:

- 1) The caption of the action against the petitioner.
- 2) The name of the court in which the action was brought.
- The nature of the claim against the petitioner.
- 4) Facts supporting the claim of the petitioner that the action against him orginates from his employment with the state.
- 5) The reasons why the Department of Justice (civil action) or the Public Defender (criminal action) cannot provide representation for the petitioner, if he seeks private counsel.

 If the petition is made before the United States District Court, the court may refer the petition to the President Judge of Superior Court for appropriate action.

Petition for appointment of counsel is to be made to the court in which the action against a public officer or employee of the state was brought originally. The petitioner shall serve a copy of the petition upon the Department of Justice. Petitions must be filed within 10 days upon service of complaints and summons, crossclaim or counterclaim in a civil action, or upon arrest or service of summons in a criminal action, unless extended by the court for good cause. A court receiving a petition for representation in an action for a state court shall rule on it promptly, with the time for filing of responsive pleadings, motions, or arraignment to be included. A court receiving a petition for representation in an action in Federal Court shall rule on it as promptly as possible.

A court in which the petition has been filed may order the record supplemented, at a hearing or otherwise, or motion of the petitioner, the Department of Justice or the Public Defender, or at the initiative of the court.

Private counsel appointed under this rule shall be compensated for their services and reimbursed for costs accumulated in representing the defendant at the ordinary rate for comparable cases.

Counsel must petition the Court in advance for permission to incur costs or charges for transcripts, interpreters, investigators, expert witnesses, and other costs of extraordinary amount, or for unusual services related to the litigation. Private counsel entitled to compensation or reimbursement for these reasons shall apply to the appointing court for payment at the conclusion of the litigation save upon a showing of sufficient need, in which case the application may be made at any time.

RULE 10B(F)

This replacement of the previous Rule 10B(f), effective 4-28-77, states that if both the Department of Justice and the Court concur that a conflict of interest does or may exist, the Court may appoint an attorney from the private bar. Previously, the Court automatically appointed an attorney from the private bar in response to a certification from the Department of Justice.

RULE 32A(5)

This addition to Rule 32A(5), effective 9-28-76, determined that the number of years of bar membership is to be calculated with the first calender year beginning on January 1st of the year following admission to the bar, and annual assessments are not to be prorated.

Court of Chancery

RULE 192

The amendment to Rule 192, effective ll-15-76, established the total commission and fees allowable for personal representatives and attorneys in estates for decedents dying on or after January 1, 1977. The minimum payment (total commission plus fees) allowable in a Commissionable Estate bracket must be greater than or equal to the maximum payment permitted for the previous Commissionable Estate bracket. The minimum payment levels have been raised from the previous Rule 192 by about 10%. The total payment increases with the size of the estate, but the payment as a percentage of the estate decreases as the estate increases in size.

The amended Rule 192 permits the gross estate to be determined as the Inventory and Appraisement plus one-half of the jointly owned property and one-half of the real property of the decedent not sold by the personal representative plus the additional assets received into the estate. The previous Rule 192 did not consider

the sale of property by a personal representative prior to determining jointly-owned property value, nor did it consider the real property of the decedent.

Newly added to Rule 192 are the following factors to be used in determining the commission and fees:

Time spent.

Risk or responsibility involved. 2)

Novelty and difficulty of questions raised. 3)

- Skill and experience of the personal representative or attorney.
- Comparable rates for similar services in the same locality.

Character of the estate property.

Benefits obtained by the administration for the estate. 7)

Loss of other business caused by acceptance of the administration. 8)

9) Time limitations.

Any request for the allowance of additional fees as to any estate must be made by petition to the Court. The petition is to explain fully the grounds of the request as they exist, such as:

- Where detailed time records aren't available, the Court may allocate additional fees in accordance with the customary amount of additional time to be spent.
- Multiple representatives may be entitled to an aggregate sum 2) which may exceed the maximum level for a single representative.
- Fees for an ancillary personal representative due to the non-Delaware assets of a decedent whose estate is primarily administered in Delaware shall be added onto the total payment for the principle administration of the estate.

The latter two explanations are new to Rule 192.

Superior Court

CRIMINAL RULE 6(B)2

Effective 10-13-76, this amendment to Rule 6(b)2 adds a reference to the manner in which to move for dismissal. The rule specifies that the manner prescribed in Chapter 45, Title 10 of the Delaware Code is proper in making a motion to dismiss.

CRIMINAL RULE 6(G)

This addition to Rule 6, effective 10-13-76, states that the tenure and powers of a grand jury are independent of the terms of Court; grand jurors are to serve until discharged by the Court. Shown cause at any time, the Court may excuse a juror permanently, in which case the Court may impanel another juror in the vacated position, or temporarily.

CRIMINAL RULE 7(G)

Rule 7(g) which provided that persons detained without bond have their trials scheduled within two months of their indictment or information or else be released on unsecured bond, was stricken effective 7-1-76.

CRIMINAL RULE 9

Amended Rule 9 was effective 7-1-76. According to the ammended rule, the Prothonotary shall issue a warrant rather than a summons if:

- The defendant has failed to appear in response to a past summons or if a prior summons is returned unserved; or,
- 2) The Attorney General certifies that the defendant has failed to respond to an outstanding summons or warrant by any Delaware Court in any criminal prosecution; or,
- 3) The Attorney General certifies the presence of a substantial risk to public safety or risk of departure from the state by the defendant unless he is arrested immediately; or,
- 4) The Attorney General certifies, and the Court approves, that a warrant should be issued in lieu of a summons.

The other change in amended Rule 9 is in part (c) (1). In the previous system, a person arrested under a warrant was brought before Superior Court or, in the case of admission to bail, to the Prothonotary, sheriff, or officer who deals with the process. Now, the arrested person is taken before a Justice of the Peace in the same county as the one in which the warrant was issued unless the defendant is entitled to release on bail. In that case, the arrested person is taken before a judge or court commissioner of Municipal Court to determine the level of bail required, if indeed bail is permitted. In lieu of the foregoing, a defendant may be brought before Superior Court for arraignment and setting of bail at the next regularly scheduled time for arraignment if this would not result in unreasonable delay.

CRIMINAL RULE 24(A)

This amendment to the previous Rule 24(a), effective 10-13-76, adds a requirement that all questions proposed for usage by an attorney in voir dire examination be submitted to the Court in writing prior to the commencement of the drawing of the jury, or at such times as the Court orders.

CRIMINAL RULE 24(D)

This amendment to Rule 24(d), effective 10-13-76, permits the Attorney General and defendant to challenge the array of jurors in the manner set in Chapter 45, Title 10 of the Delaware

Code, with the challenge to be granted under the conditions established in said statute. The previous Rule 24(d) dealt with the matter of the array of jurors without direct reference to the Delaware Code.

CRIMINAL RULE 24(E)

An amendment of Rule 24(e), effective 10-13-76, states that pertinent information about prospective jurors (name, address, age, education, occupation, name of employer) to be used in the exercise of challenges shall be disclosed to the parties upon reasonable request prior to voir dire examination, unless ordered otherwise by the Court. The previous rule did not place a time constraint as to the availability of information on jurors for either the Attorney General or the defendant or his attorney. Previously, the length of residence in the county and state was also considered to be pertinent information.

CRIMINAL RULE 24(F)

This replacement for the previous Rule 24(f) was effective 8-17-76. The rule simply states that there will be no sequestration of jurors unless it is ordered by the court.

CRIMINAL RULE 37.1

Effective 7-1-76, Rule 37A was stricken and Rule 37.1 took its place. Rule 37.1 deals with notice to the Attorney General, appeal de novo, and appeals on the record. Rule 37.1(a), titled "Notice to Attorney General", is identical with paragraph one of Rule 37A, which states that the Prothonotary shall give written notice to the Attorney General's office in the county in which the appeal is lodged immediately upon the entry of an appeal in a criminal case. Rule 37.1(b), titled "Appeals de novo", indicates that the proceeding in an appeal de novo will continue in accordance with set rules once the Attorney General files an information with the Prothonotary. Rule 37A had set a 20 day limit for the Attorney General in which to file an information for a trial de novo. Rule 37.1(c), titled "Appeals on the Record", allows Superior Court Civil Rule 72 to govern for an action where the appeal is on the record from the lower court, unless it is inconsistent with express provision in these rules or inapplicable for other reasons.

CRIMINAL RULE 39.1

Rule 39.1, effective 7-1-76, is adopted under the title "Dismissal of Appeals". According to Rule 39.1, an appeal may be dismissed due to lack of jurisdiction, failure to comply with a statutory requirement, or by rule or order of the Court.

CRIMINAL RULE 44

This addition to existing Rule 44, effective 2-22-77, states that Supreme Court Rule 10B governs the process for the appointment of counsel for State officers and employees.

CRIMINAL RULE 45(D)

Effective 1-1-77, this amendment changes the time in which a written motion and notice of the hearing may be served to not later than 2 days before the time set for the hearing, unless stated otherwise by the Court. Previously, the period for notice had been 5 days in advance, unless stated otherwise by the Court. This does not apply for ex parte motions.

For a motion supported by an affadavit, the affadavit is still to be served with the motion, and opposing affadavits still must be served at least 1 day before the hearing unless the Court rules otherwise.

CRIMINAL RULE 46(A)

The original Rule 46(a) was stricken and replaced by a new Rule 46(a) on 7-1-76. The title of the rule was changed from "Right to Bail" to "Right to Bail; Modification for Delay". Both rules state that the defendant shall be admitted to bail before or after conviction and pending appeal as stated in the Constitution and State Laws. The new rule adds that unnecessary delay in presenting a charge to the grand jury, in filing an information, or in bringing a defendant to trial may cause the Court to modify the terms for release on bail.

CRIMINAL RULE 48(B)

Effective 7-1-76, Rule 48(b) states that the Court may dismiss an indictment, information, or complaint if there is unnecessary delay in presenting a charge to the grand jury or in the filing of an information to bring a defendant to trial. The previous rule required either an indictment or an information against a person held in Superior Court no later than two terms after the person was held or else he was to be released without bail.

CIVIL RULE 47C

Rule 47C, which required that the sheriff's return show the resident addresses of petit jurors, was repealed effective 10-13-76.

CIVIL RULE 47D

Rule 47D, which contained the former regulations on juror challenges, was repealed on 10-13-76.

CIVIL RULE 58A(F)

Effective 12-6-76, this rule states that publication of the notice letter, in response to the undelivered return of the certified mail sent to a debtor, shall be weekly for two weeks in a newspaper which circulates in the county in which the instrument is to be recorded. Also, there will be weekly publication of the letter of notice for two weeks in a newspaper of general circulation in the county in this state in which the debtor was last known to reside. Previously this publication was in the county in which the debtor was last known to reside, which need not have been in this state.

CIVIL RULE 58 (H) (5)

This amendment, effective 12-6-76, makes changes similar to those in Rule 58A(f). The weekly publication for two weeks in a newspaper of general circulation is for the county in this state in which the debtor was last known to reside. This is a change from the former rule, which had the publication in the county in which the debtor was last known to reside regardless of what state that may have been.

CIVIL RULE 58A

Rule 58A was redesignated as Rule 58.1 on 7-1-76.

CIVIL RULE 58B

Rule 58B was redesignated as Rule 58.2, effective 7-1-76.

CIVIL RULE 58C

Rule 58C was redesignated as Rule 58.3 on 7-1-76.

CIVIL RULE 72(H)

Effective 7-1-76, Rule 72(h) was stricken. This rule formerly stated that appeals from the Court of Common Pleas for Kent and Sussex Counties were governed by local rules as adopted by Superior Court.

CIVIL RULE 77(B)

Effective 5-23-77, this amendment deletes the prohibition against civil trials during the June term of Superior Court.

CIVIL RULE 89

Effective 2-22-77, Supreme Court Rule 10B is to govern the appointment of counsel for State officers and employees.

CIVIL RULE 90

Effective 6-1-77, only those admitted to the Delaware Bar or otherwise permitted to practice in the courts and administrative tribunals of this State by the Delaware Supreme Court are entitled to practice as an attorney in Superior Court.

The Court may admit pro hac vice (one-time) attorneys who are not members of the Delaware Bar. Applications for admission pro hac vice is to be in the form of a written motion by a member of the Delaware Bar who maintains an office in this state for the practice of law. He shall sign or receive service of all notices, orders, pleadings, or other papers filed in this action, and he shall attend before the Court, Prothonotary, or other Court officials. The applicant shall certify his status as a member in good standing of the Bar of another state, and that he shall be bound by the Delaware Lawyer's Code of Professional Responsibility in its applicability to litigation. Admission pro hac vice is at the pleasure of the Court.

The Court will not consider agreements between attorneys unless they are in writing and are filed with the Prothonotary or else stated on the record in the presence of the Court.

Justice of the Peace Courts

MISCELLANEOUS RULE 2

Effective 1-7-77, Supreme Court Rule 10B governs the procedure to be followed in the appointment of counsel for State officers and employees.

Family Court

RULE 435

Effective 1-7-77, Supreme Court Rule 10B governs the procedure to be followed in the appointment of counsel for State officers and employees.

Board of Bar Examiners

RULE BR-55.3(B)

Effective 12-10-76, an individual may now be introduced to the Supreme Court by a member of the bar. The previous rule required that the individual be introduced to the Court by a member of the Board of Bar Examiners.

Court on the Judiciary

RULE 3(D)

Effective 10-15-76, this amendment clarifies the rights of the complainant before the Investigatory Committee when investigated for misconducts or disabilities. If the Committee first determines that the complaint does allege misconducts or disabilities, it may permit the complainant reasonable opportunity to appear before member(s) of the committee. At that time, the complainant may present either orally or in writing such relevant evidence as he chooses.

Legislation

LEGISLATION

House of Representatives

HOUSE BILL 40

This bill amends Chapter 5, Part 1, Title 11 by increasing the penalties for prostitution. It became law on 5/5/77.

HOUSE BILL 69

This is the second leg of a Constitutional Amendment which repeals the prohibition against change of venue in suits brought in the courts of Delaware. The amendment of Article 1, §9 eliminates the previous requirement that "every action shall be tried in the county in which it shall be commenced." It was enacted on 5/31/77.

HOUSE BILL 190

This bill changes Chapter 5, Subchapter II, Subpart D of Title 11 by increasing the age limit from 12 to 16 for sexual offenses, sexual assault, and sodomy. It was signed into law on 5/23/77.

HOUSE BILL 332

This supplemental appropriation, signed 6/30/77, added \$144,654 for the judiciary in fiscal 1977. Of this amount, \$97,561 (two-thirds of the total), was for jury fees.

HOUSE BILL 408

This new statute on obscenity forbids persons under age 12 on premises where material harmful to minors is sold or made available for commercial distribution and is readily accessible to or easily viewed by minors. Obscenity is set as a Class D Felony when involving persons under 18 years old. Where the criminality of conduct depends upon the age of the child, ignorance of the child's age is no defense for the action. The bill was signed 7/8/77.

HOUSE BILL 498

This bill, enacted on 7/20/77, deals with adoption and termination of parental rights. The statutes as amended now include further

information on what constitutes an acceptable affidavit for a petition when dealing with a child born out of wedlock. The term 'child', previously undefined, now is defined.

Senate

SENATE BILL 28

The new capital punishment law was signed 5/14/77. Punishment for first degree murder is set as either death or life imprisonment without probation or parole or any other reductions. Previously, the death penalty was mandatory except where found unconstitutional, in which case the sentence was life imprisonment without any reduction or probation. A separate hearing to determine the punishment for a first degree murder is to be held before the jury and trial judge, with alternate jurors available if needed. A new jury and a new group of alternates is chosen if a jury can't be chosen from the original jurors and alternates.

Any evidence deemed relevant and admissable to the determination of punishment may be presented at the punishment hearing. Matters relating to any mitigating circumstances and to any aggravating circumstances are admissable if the other side is given written notice about such information between the guilty verdict and the punishment hearing. The defendant's record of any prior criminal convictions and pleas, or the lack thereof, shall be admissable in evidence. The argument shall consist of opening statements by the State and by the defendant and/or his counsel, unless waived, opening summation by the State, rebuttal summation by the defendant and/or his counsel, and closing summation by the State. The judge shall then instruct the jury, including instructions to weigh any mitigating circumstances or any aggravating circumstances as well as any statutory aggravating circumstances. The jury is to weigh any mitigating factors against the aggravating factors.

The death sentence will not be imposed unless:

- At least one statutory aggravating circumstance is found beyond a reasonable doubt and
- 2) The recommendation for the death penalty is unanimous.

If both of the above are found, it is to bind the court in the sentencing of the defendant to the death penalty. Refusal or failure by the court to follow the jury recommendation of the death penalty is appealable by the State to the Supreme Court within thirty days after sentencing.

The death sentencing shall be imposed upon terms and conditions as set by the trial court, with the method of execution to be hanging by the neck. The sentence is not to be imposed prior to final review by the Supreme Court, and the Court or the Governor may suspend the execution date in order to permit completion of the judicial review. A verdict of imposition of the death penalty is to be reviewed by the Supreme Court. If the defense has not presented an appeal within thirty days, the clerk of the Supreme Court shall request a transcript of the punishment hearing. Upon receipt of the transcript, the clerk shall have 10 days to prepare a notice to the Supreme Court containing certain specified points. The Supreme Court in review shall then determine if:

- 1) The evidence indicates that the recommended penalty was in contrast with similar cases arising under this act.
- 2) The evidence supports the finding of a statutory aggravating circumstance.

The defendant and the state may submit briefs within the time period set by the Supreme Court, and arguments may be presented to the Supreme Court. The Supreme Court then has the following choices:

- 1) Affirm the death penalty.
- 2) Require the trial court to reinstate the death penalty if it has been in error, as determined by the Supreme Court, in rejecting the jury's recommendation of the death penalty.
- 3) Set aside the death sentence and remand for correction of the errors involved. This does not change the guilty status of the defendant, and it does not restrict the new hearing from recommending the death penalty if so decided.

The Supreme Court is to set forth its findings for the reasons of its actions. The verdict of the trial may be reviewed as well.

SENATE BILL 52

This bill, which became law on 7/14/77, deals with recoupment of defense costs incurred by the state. A court may require a convicted defendant who has used court-appointed attorneys or the Public Defender's office to pay defense costs. Only costs incurred specifically by the defense shall be considered, with costs inherent in providing a constitutionally guaranteed jury trial and/or expenses due to maintenance and operation of government agencies which must be made public regardless of specific violations of law

not to be included. The amount, if any, and the method of payment is determined by the court. The defendant may petition the court for remission of any or all of such payments if he has not been in default of his payments.

When the court determines that payment is required, the court may set a specified time period for installment payments, or it may demand full, immediate payment. Such payments may set as conditions for probation or suspension of sentence. Failure by the defendant may lead to his being cited for contempt of court.

SENATE BILL 114

This bill adds to Chapter 6, Title 31 of the Delaware Code a new §604, dealing with the penalties for the misuse of food stamps. It is illegal for any person to knowingly obtain or attempt to obtain or aid any person to obtain food stamps in a fraudulent manner. Food stamps or coupons or food obtained by food stamps are not transferable to a person not entitled to use them. Food stamps are to be exchanged only for foods or food products for human consumption, which is not to include alcoholic beverages, beer, or tobacco. The Court of Common Pleas is to have jurisdiction over such offenses. Any store which permits the purchase of one or more prohibited items as set by this chapter or by any other official regulation shall not be allowed to participate in the food stamp program. The bill became law on 7/11/77.

SENATE BILL 185

This bill, signed into law on 7/14/77, states that no sentence of confinement of a defendant will run concurrently with any other sentence of confinement for the defendant.

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
