



Administrative Office of the Courts

ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICE OF THE COURTS

Legal Authorization

The Administrative Office of the Courts was established by 10 Delaware Code, Chapter 1, during the 1971 General Assembly.

Duties

The Administrative Office of the Courts serves as the focal point for coordination and communications concerning all court administrative activities in the judicial system. The office prepares budgets for the Supreme Court, Court of Chancery, and the Foster Care Review Board, and assists in preparation of the budgets of the Public Guardian and the Law Libraries. It administers the payment of all jurors and witnesses. The AOC is largely responsible for the acquisition of space or facilities for the judicial system, and is responsible for the supervision of lease negotiations and the payment of all rentals. It has primary responsibility for the acquisition, supervision, and administration of federal funds received to assist the court system. The Administrative Office of the Courts has responsibility for the development and maintenance of the computerized judicial information system. Also, the AOC acts as the focal point between the court system and other government agencies on the local, state, and federal levels. The AOC will implement and manage the upcoming judicial personnel system.

Personnel

The Director of the Administrative Office of the Courts is appointed by and serves at the pleasure of the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of the State of Delaware.

The Director may, with the approval of the Chief Justice, appoint such assistants and clerical personnel as are required.

Supreme Court

Authorization

The Supreme Court is created by the Constitution of Delaware, Article IV, Section I. The Supreme Court has statewide juriscition and sits in Dover.

Jurisdiction

The Court has final appellate jurisdiction in criminal cases in which the sentence exceeds certain minimums and in civil cases as to final judgments and certain other orders of Superior Court, Court of Chancery and Family Court. Appeals are heard on the record. The Supreme Court has jurisdiction to issue writs of prohibition, quo warranto, certiorari, and mandamus.

Justices

The Supreme Court consists of a Chief Justice and four Justices, who are appointed by the Governor with the consent of the Senate. The Justices are appointed for 12-year terms and must be learned in the law and must be citizens of the State. Three of the Justices are of one of the major political parties while the other two Justices are of the other major political party.

Administration

The Chief Justice is responsible for the administration of all courts in the State and appoints a Director of the Administrative Office of the Courts to manage the non-judicial aspects of court administration. The Supreme Court is staffed by a Clerk and Chief Deputy Clerk, law clerks, and secretaries.

Caseload Trend

While the total of 332 criminal and civil cases filed in FY 1980 is 7 less than the 339 filings in FY 1979, a decrease of 2.1%, the total of 366 dispositions in FY 1980 represents a 2.2% increase from the 358 dispositions in FY 1979. As a result, the number of pending cases decreased from 310 to 276 in FY 1980, a decrease of 11.0% for the second consecutive annual drop in pendings. This may be attributed to the recent enlargement of the Court to 5 Justices. From filing to disposition, civil appeals were disposed of in an average of 297.1 days, criminal appeals in an average of 363.8 days, and other cases in an average of 168.8 days. The average of all cases combined was 312.8 days from filing to disposition, slightly less than the average of 316.5 days in FY 1979.





Court of Chancery

Legal Authorization

The Constitution of Delaware, Article IV, Section 1, authorizes the Court of Chancery.

Geographic Organization

The Court of Chancery holds court in Wilmington, Dover, and Georgetown; that is, at one location in each county in the county seat.

Legal Jurisdiction

The Court of Chancery has jurisdiction to hear and determine all matters and causes in equity. The general equity jurisdiction of the Court is measured in terms of the general equity jurisdiction of the High Court of Chancery of Great Britain as it existed prior to the separation of the American Colonies. The General Assembly may confer upon the Court of Chancery additional statutory jurisdiction. In today's practice, the litigation in the Court of Chancery consists largely of corporate matters, trusts, estates, and other fiduciary matters, disputes involving the purchase and sale of land, and the clearing of clouds on title, as well as commercial and contractual matters in general. When issues of fact to be tried by jury arise, the Court of Chancery may order such facts to trial by issues in Superior Court.

Judges

One Chancellor and two Vice-Chancellors hold the Court of Chancery. The Chancellor and Vice-Chancellors are appointed by the Governor with the consent of the majority of the Senate's elected members for 12 year terms. The Chancellor and Vice-Chancellors must be learned in the law and must be Delaware citizens.

Support Personnel

The Chancellor may appoint court reporters, bailiffs, criers or pages, and law clerks. Each of the judges may appoint one Chief Deputy Register in Chancery in each county.

The Register of Wills acts as a Clerk of the Court of Chancery for probate matters. The majority of the Register's former judicial and quasijudicial power are now held by the Court of Chancery. A Register of Wills is elected in each county for that county. The Chancellor names a Chief Deputy Register of Wills for each county.

Public Guardian

The Chancellor has the duty to appoint the Public Guardian. The Public Guardian serves, when appointed by the Court, as the guardian of the person and/or property of the aged, the mentally infirm and the physically incapacitated. Under the law, the Public Guardian is intended to be the guardian of last resort.

Caseload Trend

The number of cases handled by the Court of Chancery and the corresponding change from the previous fiscal year varied within the separate categories of work handled by the Court of Chancery (civil cases, miscellaneous matters and estates) during fiscal year 1980. The number of civil cases filed rose from 417 in FY 1979 to 440 in FY 1980, which was an increase of 5.5%. The 569 miscellaneous matters filed in FY 1980 was an increase of 95 filings from the FY 1979 total of 474 miscellaneous matters filed, representing an increase of 20.0%. However, the 1,757 estates filed in FY 1980 was actually a very slight decrease of 0.5% from the 1,766 filings in FY 1980. The Court of Chancery disposed of virtually the same number of civil cases in FY 1979(383) and FY 1980(384), with an increase of 8.1% in the number of civil cases pending from 695 at the end of FY 1979 to 40.31 in FY 1980, an increase of 13.1%. Despite this increase in the number of miscellaneous matters diposed of, the even larger increase in filings from FY 1979 to FY 1980 resulted in a net pending rise of 2.0% from 4,302 at the end of FY 1979 to 4,388 at the end of FY 1980. However, the 11.8% increase in estates closed from 1,657 in FY 1979 to 1,852 in FY 1980 led to a decrease of 3.8% in pending at the end of 1980 to 2,432 from the 2,527 estates pending at the end of FY 1979.













Public Guardian

PUBLIC GUARDIAN

Legal Authorization

The authority for the Office of the Public Guardian is derived from Title 12, § 3991, of the <u>Delaware</u> Code:

"There is established the Office of the Public Guardian. The Chancellor shall appoint the Public Guardian, who shall serve at his pleasure. The salary of the Public Guardian shall be \$18,500.00 per annum, to be paid from the General Fund. The Chancellor, in his discretion, may require the Public Guardian to post bond."

Geographic Organization

The Office of the Public Guardian has responsibility for the entire state and presents its petitions for guardianships in the Court of Chancery in all three counties.

Legal Jurisdiction

The powers and duties of the Public Guardian are spelled out in Title 12, § 3992, of the Delaware Code:

"The Public Guardian, when appointed as guardian by Court Order, shall:

- 1. Serve as a guardian for the property of aged, mentally or physically incapacitated persons, pursuant to § 3914 of this title;
- 2. Serve as a guardian for the person of aged, mentally or physically incapacitated persons where such persons are in danger of substantially endangering their health, or of becoming subject to abuse by other persons, or of becoming the victim of designing persons; or,
- 3. Serve as both guardian of the person and of property of such person."

The intent of the legislation creating the Office of the Public Guardian was to create a guardianship capability for those situations in which a person needing a guardian does not have any relative, friend, or other person interested in or capable of serving as a guardian, whose estate is insufficient to purchase the services of a private guardian, or who would be best served by a neutral guardian.

Personnel

The Public Guardian is assisted by an administrative assistant and one caseworker.

Caseload

In the year of operation July 1, 1979, to June 30, 1980, the office received 204 referrals. Of this number, 11 were determined to need the services of the Public Guardian as a guardian, and petitions were presented in the appropriate counties. As of June 30, 1980, the Public Guardian had responsibility for a total of 39 wards.

The remaining 193 cases were determined not to need guardianship for the solution of their problems and were served by mobilizing the resources of other state and private agencies to aid the client, involving the family of the client, helping the client to take some voluntary action on his own behalf, or simply offering counselling to help the client solve his own problems. Their services were provided by two caseworkers who are paid solely from Federal funds (Title XX of the Social Security Act). This program is maintained by the Office of the Public Guardian as an adjunct to its primary function of legal guardianship, because of the absence of any adult protective service program in the Department of Health and Social Services. About eighty-five percent of all individuals referred to the Office of the Public Guardian are in need of protective services rather than legal guardianship.

Effective July 1, 1980, the Title XX was terminated. The 2 caseworker positions were not picked up in the State budget, and there is no further service given to cases not requiring guardianship as a result. Furthermore, the existing caseload of wards has dictated a cut-back of about 75 percent in the number of new guardianship referrals which can be handled in Fiscal Year 1981.

Superior Court

Legal Authorization

The Constitution of Delaware, Article IV, Section 1, created the Superior Court.

Geographic Organization

Sessions of Superior Court are held in each of the three counties at the county seat.

Legal Jurisdiction

Superior Court has statewide original jurisdiction over criminal and civil cases, except equity cases, over which the Court of Chancery has exclusive jurisdiction. The Court has exclusive jurisdiction over felonies and drug offenses (except most felonies and drug offenses involving minors and except possession of marijuana cases).

Superior Court has jurisdiction over adoptions and terminations of parental rights which were filed before September 9, 1980, and also over involuntary commitments of the mentally ill to the Delaware State Hospital. The Court serves as an intermediate appellate court, hearing appeals on the record from the Court of Common Pleas, Family Court, administrative agencies such as the Industrial Accident Board, Unemployment Insurance Appeal Board, Alcohol Beverage Control Commission, Tax Appeal Board, Zoning and Adjustment Boards, and other quasi-judicial bodies. Appeals from Alderman's Courts, Justice of the Peace Courts, and Municipal Court are heard as trials de novo (second trials) in Superior Court. Appeals from Superior Court are argued on the record before the Supreme Court.

Judges

Number: There are eleven judges appointed to the Superior Court bench; one is appointed President Judge with administrative responsibility for the Court, and three are appointed as Resident Judges and must reside in the county in which they are appointed. There can not be more than a majority of one as far as political affiliation of the Judges, with the affiliation of the Judges to be divided between the major political parties.

Appointment: The Governor appoints Superior Court Judges with the consent of the Senate.

Tenure: The judges are appointed for 12-year terms.

Qualifications: The judges must be learned in the law and must be members of the Delaware Bar.

Support Personnel

Superior Court may appoint court reporters, law clerks, bailiffs, presentence officers, a secretary for each judge, and other personnel.

An elected Prothonotary for each county serves as Clerk of Superior Court for that county. The Prothonotary is the record keeper for Superior Court, and as such, the Prothonotary is directly involved with the civil court calendar. The office handles the jury list, property liens, registration of law students and attorneys, and is the custodian of costs and fees for the courts and for the Attorney General. Further, the Prothonotary's Office is charged with the security, care and custody of Court's exhibits.

Elected Sheriffs, one per county, also serves Superior Court.

Caseload Trend

Superior Court was able, in FY 1980 to dispose of 87.4% of its criminal cases in New Castle County (86.2% statewide) within 120 days of arrest, the time interval specified by the Chief Justice's Speedy Trial Directive. The Court was able to achieve this rate because the Court controls its own criminal calendar through the Case Scheduling Office and the Criminal Office Judge, and because of the policy in New Castle County of regularly assigning 5 of New Castle County's 8 judges to criminal matters and 3 to civil matters. The total number of criminal cases filed in FY 1980 in Superior Court rose by over 6% from FY 1979 while the number of criminal cases disposed of decreased by almost 7%. Thus, the Court did not dispose of as many criminal cases as were filed, and thus the number of pending cases statewide rose by 12.3%. Superior Court held 255 criminal trials in FY 1980, down from the total of 325 criminal trials held in FY 1979.

However, Superior Court's emphasis on criminal cases has continued to affect its effort to deal with its civil jurisdiction. The Court experienced a 6.6% rise in the number of filings statewide, and while the Court disposed of 11.2% more civil cases in FY 1980 than it did in FY 1979, it still was not able to dispose of as many cases as were filed. Thus, the number of civil cases pending adjudication rose by more than 5% in FY 1980.

FISCAL YEAR 1980 CRIMINAL FILINGS EXPLANATORY NOTES

- 1. All figures represent numbers of defendants only; they should not be confused with numbers of indictments, numbers of cases, criminal action numbers, or any other such figures.
- 2. A defendant is defined as an individual named in an indictment, so that an individual named in 3 indictments is counted as 3 defendants. An individual with a consecutively-numbered series of informations, appeals, or transfers filed on the same day is counted as one defendant.
- 3. In Kent County only, each charge indicted against each defendant is returned as a separate indictment. Due to this practice, each person indicted at a Grand Jury session is counted as one defendant, no matter how many charges are indicted against that defendant, and without regard to later actions of the Attorney General which lead to separate trials.
- 4. Informations represent defendants who have waived indictment.
- 5. Transfers are defendants brought before the Court of Common Pleas in New Castle County who request jury trials. Since the Court of Common Pleas in Kent and Sussex Counties itself holds jury trials, there are no transfers in those 2 counties.
- 6. Although New Informations are given separate criminal action numbers by Superior Court, they are not counted in these figures since they represent amendments to charges facing defendants already pending before the court, not new defendants. Inclusion of New Informations as filings should artifically inflate the number of defendants filed in any time period.
- 7. Reinstatements represent defendants who have had their cases disposed of who are brought back before Superior Court for one of the following reasons:
 - -Mistrial
 - -Hung Jury
 - -Motion for new trial granted
 - -Guilty plea withdrawn
 - -Lower court appeal reinstated after being dismissed
 - -Conviction overturned by Supreme Court; remanded to Superior Court for new trial
- 8. Severances are defendants indicted on multiple charges whose charges are severed to be tried separately.

FISCAL YEAR 1980 CRIMINAL DISPOSITIONS EXPLANATORY NOTES

- 1. All figures represent numbers of defendants only; they should not be confused with numbers of cases, criminal action numbers, or any other such figures.
- 2. A defendant is defined as an individual named in an indictment; an individual named in three indictments is counted as 3 defendants. An individual with a consecutively-numbered series of informations, appeals, or transfers filed on the same day is counted as one defendant.
- 3. The trial dispositions refer to the number of defendants whose charges were disposed of at a trial, not the number of trials per se. The date of disposition is the trial date, unless the decision is reserved, in which case it is the date when the opinion is handed down.
- 4. A defendant is counted as being disposed of by nolle prosequi only if all charges in an indictment or information or all charges transferred or appealed simultaneously are dropped. If a defendant pleads guilty to one charge in an indictment, and other charges in the same indictment are then nol-prossed, that defendant is considered to have been disposed of by guilty plea, and his disposition date is the date of the plea.
- 5. Defendants are not counted as disposed of by nol-pros if the nolle prosequi was filed to an original charge because the defendant entered a guilty plea to a New Information. Since the New Information is a further action in an existing case and is not counted as a separate filing, so also the nol-pros is not the primary disposition. Counting a defendant as nol-prossed and as having entered a plea to a new information would mean counting two dispositions for one case.
- 6. Only nol-prosses filed for defendants who were actually brought before Superior Court by indictment, information, appeal, transfer, or reinstatement are counted in the total number of Superior Court dispositions. Nolle prosequis of unindicted defendants are listed separately because such defendants were never formally before the Superior Court. Counting them as dispositions would be erroneously counting dispositions for cases which were never filed.
- 7. Remands are defendants who appealed or transferred their cases to Superior Court and had them remanded back to lower court. ADDR's are cases in which an appeal to Superior Court has been dismissed with the record being remanded to the court from which it came.

- 8. ADRR's and remands do not constitute the dispositions of all appeals that are filed; some are disposed of by trial de novo, plea, or nolle prosequi.
- 9. Other types of dispositions include consolidations and diversions. A consolidation represents a single individual who is indicted separately on different charges but whose charges are consolidated to be tried together. Thus an individual indicted in January and again in February, and who is counted as two filings, who has the charges tried together will receive one trial disposition and one consolidation disposition. Diversions represent those defendants who are charged with driving under the influence and are first time offenders. The defendants elect to enroll in a rehabilitation program and waive their right to a speedy trial. If the individual satisfactorily completes the program and pays all fees, the driving under the influence charge will be nolle prossed.
- 10. Unindicted nolle prosequis are felony or drug defendants who were arrested and were bound over to Superior Court by a lower court either because probable cause was found or because the defendant waived preliminary hearing. The Attorney General then decided not to seek indictment or the grand jury ignored the indictment and a nolle prosequi was filed. Unindicted nolle prosequis are not counted as dispositions because they are not counted as filings until an indictment or information is filed.

- 1. The following guilty plea dispositions do not include pleas made during trials. They are included in the trial disposition totals.
- 2. "PG-Most Serious" indicates that the defendant pled guilty to the major charge of a multi-count indict-ment, appeal, transfer, or reinstatement.
- 3. "PG-LIO" denotes that a defendant pled guilty to a lesser included offense of the most serious charge. Pleas of guilty to amended informations are counted in with the PG-LIO's.
- 4. "PG-Lesser" indicates a plea of guilty to a lesser charge of the same indictment or other filing.
- 5. "PG-LIO Lesser" means that the defendant pled guilty to a lesser included offense of a lesser charge of a multi-count indictment or other filing. This is the weakest type of plea.
- 6. "PG-NI" indicates that a defendant pled guilty to a new information always a less serious charge than the original one.
- 7. "PG-Information" denotes a defendant who waived indictment and pled guilty to an information filed by the Attorney General. This is always a reduced charge.
- 8. A plea of nolo contendere is considered to be the equivalent of a guilty plea; e.g., a plea of nolo contendere to an LIO is counted in with the PG-LIO's.





PERFORMANCE ANALYSIS
EXPLANATORY NOTES

- 1. The Speedy Trial Directive of Chief Justice Daniel L. Herrmann states that all criminal defendants brought before Superior Court should be tried within 120 days of arrest.
- 2. The Elapsed Time charts measure the average and median time intervals between arrest and disposition, and the average and median time intervals between indictment and disposition. Since Superior Court cases do not all originate by indictment, it is not possible to subtract the figures for indictment to disposition from the figures for arrest to disposition to determine preindictment time intervals.
- 3. In measuring the elapsed time of defendants for the purposes of computing compliance with speedy trial directives or average elapsed time, Superior Court excludes the following time intervals:
 - a. For all capiases, the time between the date the capias is issued and the date the capias is executed.
 - b. In the case of arraignment capiases, the interval between the execution of the capias and arraignment.
 - c. In the case of trial capiases, the time between execution of the capias and the first scheduled trial date.
 - d. For all Rule 9 Summonses and Rule 9 Warrants, the time between arrest and indictment, if any.
 - e. In the case of Rule 9 Warrants, the interval between indictment and arrest.
 - f. In the case of Rule 9 Summonses which are superseded by Rule 9 Warrants, the full interval between indictment and arrest.
 - g. For all nolle prosequis, all time between the scheduled trial date and the actual filing date of the nolle prosequi.









The Complaints category includes Complaints for Damages, Condemnations, Ejectments, Appeals from Justice of the Peace Court, Appeals from Arbitration Panel, Declaratory Judgments, Foreign Judgments, Replevins, Foreign Attachments, Domestic Attachments, Interpleaders, Transfers and Removals from the Court of Chancery, and Transfers and Removals from the Court of Common Pleas.
- 2. Mechanic's Liens and Mortgages are property suits.
- 3. Terminations and Adoptions are parental rights cases.
- 4. Involuntary Commitments are proceedings held to determine whether individuals shall be involuntarily committed as mentally ill. Because Delaware State Hospital, the state's facility for mentally ill patients, is located in New Castle County, all Involuntary Commitment hearings are held in New Castle County.
- 5. Appeals are appeals on the record. This category includes Appeals from Administrative Agencies, Appeals from Family Court, Appeals from the Court of Common Pleas, Appeals from Municipal Court, and Certioraris.
- 6. Miscellaneous includes all other cases. During FY 1980 this category consisted of Complaints Requesting Order, Habeus Corpus, Mandamus, Writs of Prohibition, Writs of Possession, Bail Forfeitures, Petitions for Destruction of Indicia of Arrest, Petitions to Compel Satisfaction of Judgment, Petitions to Extend Judgment, Petitions to Satisfy Mortgage, Petitions to Set Aside Mortgage, Petitions for Writ of Quo Warranto, Petitions to Inspect the Record, Petitions to Quash Subpoena, Annulments of Adoption, Petitions for Redemption, Petitions for Issuance of Subpoena, Petitions for Appointment of Attorney, Out of State Depositions, Out of State Subpoenas, Petitions to Sell Real Estate for Property Taxes, Petitions for Exhumation, Petitions for Return of Property, Petitions to Vacate Public Road, Road Resolutions, and Tax Ditches.





Law Libraries

LAW LIBRARIES

There are three Law Libraries located in the State of Delaware, staffed and maintained by state funds and each presided over by a Law Librarian. The libraries are named after the counties in which they are situated.

The primary function of the Law Libraries is to provide a legal information center for the Judiciary, Public Defender's Office, legal representatives of counties and municipalities, city solicitors, and members of the Delaware Bar. They are also the official depositories for state laws, administrative regulations, and court rules. The libraries are made available to registered law students to assist them in preparation for state bar examinations and in their legal education. All three libraries are designated as official depository libraries by the U. S. Government Printing Office. As state-supported agencies, the libraries are available to the general public during normal working hours. Aid and assistance is rendered to persons wishing to make use of the facilities.

The New Castle County Law Library, located in the Public Building, Wilmington, Delaware, is the busiest of the three libraries. It houses in excess of 25,000 books and there is presently seated working space for about 26 persons at one time. The recent addition of a Microfiche reader printer to the New Castle County Law Library has proven to be a valuable addition. The facility is maintained and administered by one full-time Law Librarian. The Kent County Law Library, due to its location, is designated as the State Library. It houses the largest legal library maintained by the state with about 35,000 volumes and is staffed by one full-time librarian and one part-time assistant. The Sussex County Law Library is staffed by one Law Librarian and houses over 13,000 volumes.

All three libraries are currently in need of space for expansion due to the growing number of volumes. In addition, the Kent and Sussex Libraries have recently experienced physical problems - leaking roofs in Kent and structural difficulties in Sussex.

The Law Libraries are responsible for administrative library work as well as maintaining the bookkeeping records required by the State. These duties and responsibilities include but are not limited to the following: insertion of pocket parts, maintenance of loose leaf service bookkeeping for the agency's accounts, preparing invoices for library expenditures, filing and indexing reported and unreported opinions from the several courts, obtaining and filing copies of rules and regulations promulgated by the governmental agencies, maintaining of books and their monetary values, obtaining and filing statutes from the legislative council and other states, handling requests from various persons for information contained in the library, handling special requests for research work from the judges, planning and recommending development and improvement of services, writing reports, and performing other duties associated with library work.

Family Court

Legal Authorization

The Family Court Act, Title 10, Chapter 9, Delaware Code, authorizes the Family Court.

Geographic Organization

The Family Court is a unified statewide Court with branches in New Castle County at Wilmington, Kent County at Dover, and Sussex County at Georgetown.

Legal Jurisdiction

The Family Court has broad civil and criminal jurisdiction over domestic relations matters and over juveniles (persons under 18 years of age) who are dependent, neglected, or delinquent. Additionally, Family Court gained jurisdiction over adoptions and terminations on September 9, 1980.

Domestic relations jurisdiction includes divorces and annulments, property settlements, separate maintenance of spouses, custody and visitation of children, non-support of dependents, and actions involving family discord.

Matters heard in the interest of a child include neglect, abuse, abandonment, and contribution to the delinquency of a minor, and juvenile delinquency.

Adoptions and terminations originally filed in Superior Court will be heard in Superior Court. All adoptions and terminations filed after September 9, 1980 are filed in Family Court and will be disposed of there.

The Family Court does not have jurisdiction over adults charged with felonies nor juveniles charged with first degree murder, rape, or kidnapping.

Appeals are made, usually on the record, to Superior Court, except divorce and support cases, which are appealed on the record to the Supreme Court.

Judges

Number: There are positions for 12 judges of equal judicial authority; one is appointed Chief Judge with administrative responsibility for the Court, and the remaining 11 are Associate Judges. At present, one of the Associate Judge positions is vacant. Half of the judges must be of one major political party and half of the other major political party.

Appointment: The Governor appoints Family Court judges with the consent of the Senate.

Tenure: The judges are appointed for 12-year terms.

Qualifications: Judges must have been duly admitted to the practice of law before the Supreme Court of Delaware at least five years prior to appointment and must have a knowledge of the law and interest in and understanding of family and child problems. They shall not practice law during their tenure and may be reappointed. The Chief Judge may reside in any county. After appointment, 7 of the Associate Judges must reside in New Castle County, one in Kent County, and one in Sussex County, and one in either Kent or Sussex County.

Other Judicial Personnel

The Chief Judge appoints and commissions suitable persons, who must have resided in the State for at least five years prior to appointment, to act as masters in the Court. Masters may hear any matters properly before them, and their decisions become judgments of the Court unless disapproved by a judge. Parties may request a review de novo by a judge, by petitioning in writing within 15 days of the master's decision.

Support Personnel

The Family Court employs a staff of more than 200 persons in addition to the judiciary. The staff includes clerks of court, judicial secretaries, counselors, accounting personnel, clerks, clerk-typists, bailiffs, and process servers.

Caseload Trend

Filings in Family Court rose only slightly in FY 1980, from 27,555 in FY 1979 to 27,625 in FY 1980. This represents an increase of but .03%. Dispositions decreased by 810, or 3.0%, from 26,892 in FY 1979 to 26.082 in FY 1980.

The filings that were pending increased from 4,839, or 17.6% of FY 1979 filings, to 6,382 at the end of FY 1980, which equalled 23.1% of that year's filings. The greatest increases in filings that were pending at the close of FY 1980 were in the areas of juvenile felonies, support arrears and modifications, divorces and annulments, and divorce ancillary matters.









criminal filings for New Castle County as compared with a rise of but 6.3% in FY 1979. The statewide increase of 13.4% in FY 1979 was thus much less than the 28.6% rise in FY 1980. Dispositions of criminal cases in FY 1980 also rose by over 20% in each of the counties with a statewide increase of 23.7%, which compared with the 15.6% statewide increase in FY 1979. Despite the increase in dispositions, the large number of filings led to a 33.1% increase in criminal cases pending during the year. There was an increase in the number of civil case filings, also, with the state showing an increase of 8.8%. This is a change from the 22.6% increase in FY 1979 when all counties showed an increase of more than 20% in civil case filings for the state in FY 1979. It should be noted that civil cases filed have become more complicated and there has been a tremendous increase in the use of motion practice and discovery procedures. While this delays disposition in a number of cases, it is felt that the disposal of more complicated cases better serves the whole judicial system in the general movement of civil cases. Despite this, the number of civil cases disposed of in FY 1980 rose by 23.7%, which was a major reason why there was only a slight increase in civil cases pending at year's end.





Despite the decrease in total filings in FY 1980, the even greater decrease in total dispositions in FY 1980 led to an overall increase in pending cases at the end of the fiscal year. Criminal pending rose over 25% while the traffic pending rose over 35%, with the increase in total pending being a 31.3% rise from 1,371 at the start of the fiscal year to 1,800 at the end of the fiscal year.







Though the number of civil cases filed rosed by 15.6% in FY 1980 to 19,028 from the FY 1979 total of 16,459 civil filings, the number of civil cases pending decreased slightly during FY 1980 from 14,766 at the beginning of the fiscal year to 14,412 at the end of FY 1980. The reason for this was the sharp rise in civil dispositions from 15,384 in FY 1979 to 19,382 in FY 1980, a rise of 26.0%.







Alderman's Courts

Legal Authorization

Alderman's Courts are authorized by the town charters of their respective towns.

Geographic Organization

Alderman's Courts have jurisdiction within their own town limits only. There are 13 Alderman's Courts currently active with the Alderman's Court in Delmar closing at the end of FY 1980. When a town is without a court or an alderman for any period of time, its cases are transferred to the nearest Justice of the Peace Court.

Legal Jurisdiction

The jurisdiction of an Alderman's Court is limited to minor misdemeanors, traffic offenses, parking violations, and minor civil matters. The specific jurisdiction of each court again varies with the town charter (which is approved by the state legislature). Many courts handle only traffic and parking violations; only 5 handle as many as 100 criminal cases annually. Harrington's court handles only civil cases. Appeals are taken de novo to Superior Court within 15 days of the trial.


Aldermen

The selection, number, tenure, and qualifications of aldermen are determined by the towns themselves. Some require lawyers; others choose ordinary citizens. A few aldermen serve full-time, but most are part-time judges. In New Castle the mayor serves as judge of their court.

Caseload Trend

FY 1980 was the fourth year during which complete workload statistics were collected. All 14 courts active during FY 1979 remained active in FY 1980, and no new courts were activated. 8 of the 14 active courts experienced increases while 6 of the 14 active courts declined in workload. Overall, the total number of cases heard by aldermen in Delaware rose by almost 700, a 4.0% increase. Most Sussex County courts continue to have extremely seasonal fluctuations in their caseloads.



Violent Crimes Compensation Board

VIOLENT CRIMES COMPENSATION BOARD

Legal Authorization

The Violent Crimes Compensation Board is authorized by 11 Delaware Code, Chapter 90.

Purpose

It is the purpose of the Violent Crimes Compensation Board to "promote the public welfare by establishing a means of meeting the additional hardships imposed upon the innocent victims of certain crimes, and the family and dependents of those victims." Thus, compensation to help meet the added burdens which sometimes face the innocent victims of certain crimes may be offered by the Board for as much as \$10,000. The Board receives a 10% penalty assessment which by law is added onto every fine, penalty, and forfeiture. These monies are deposited into the 'Victim's Compensation Fund' for use when needed.

Geographic Organization

The Board is responsible for handling requests for compensation throughout the State of Delaware. Hearings on these requests are held in either Wilmington or Dover, with the Administrative Office of the Violent Crimes Compensation Board located in Wilmington.

Personnel

The Violent Crimes Compensation Board consists of five members; a chairman, a vice-chairman, and three additional Board members. Each member is appointed by the Governor and must be approved by the Senate before serving on the Board. The term of each Board member is three years so long as no more than two Board members have their terms expire at the end of any given year. The Board is to be composed of three members of one of the major political parties and two members from the other major political party. The Board may appoint an Executive Secretary and other employees as needed so long as the total number does not exceed five at any time. In addition to the Executive Secretary, the Board currently employs an administrative assistant, two claim investigators, and a secretary.

Caseload Trend

A total of \$237,516.98 was disbursed for payment of expenditures for victims, attorneys, and medical opinions. This was the largest amount disbursed in any fiscal year to date by the Board for such payments, an increase of 16.2% from the \$204,334.12 awarded in fiscal year 1979. Over the entire history of the Board, approximately two-thirds of all expenditures for any given fiscal year were for victims, attorneys, and medical opinions while the remaining one-third was for administrative costs. Through the end of FY 1980, the Board had awarded \$907,478.98 for victims, attorneys, and medical opinions.

Foster Care Review Board

FOSTER CARE REVIEW BOARD

Legal Authorization

The Foster Care Review Board is authorized by 31 Delaware Code, Chapter 38.

Purpose

The Board serves as an independent monitoring system responsible for identifying and periodically reviewing children placed in foster care. Reviews of individual children in placement are conducted to insure that continuing efforts are being made to obtain permanent homes for these children. The Board must report annually to the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, the General Assembly and the Governor upon the effectiveness of its activities and must submit recommendations regarding the policies and procedures of foster care placement agencies. Most placements of this sort (approximately 95%) are handled by the Division of Social Services.

Geographic Organization

The Board is responsible for reviewing the placements of children throughout the State of Delaware and actual review sessions are conducted in various locations across the State. The Administrative Office of the Board is located in Wilmington.

Personnel

Twenty-one citizen volunteers compose the Foster Care Review Board. Members are appointed by the Governor and serve either a one; two; or three-year term. Of the 21 Board members, not more than 11 may be members of either major political party. The Governor designates one member who serves at his pleasure as Chairman. The Board hires an Administrative Coordinator who may in turn employ additional support personnel.

Caseload Trend

The Board's enacting legislation called for the first reviewing of foster placements to begin in July of 1980. In preparation for this start up date, the Board identified the foster child population and selected a representative sample for review. This sample, rather than all foster children, is being reviewed due to the four hundred review maximum imposed upon the Board by its enabling legislation. Actual caseload data will be available after the Board's first full year of operation.

Conferences & Councils

COURT ON THE JUDICIARY

Article IV, Section 37, of the Constitution of the State of Delaware created this Court, consisting of the Chief Justice and the Associate Justices of the Supreme Court, the Chancellor, and the President Judge of Superior Court.

Any judicial officer appointed by the Governor may be censured, removed, or retired by the Court on the Judiciary for willful misconduct in office, willful and persistent failure to perform duties, commission of an offense involving moral turpitude, other misconduct in violation of the Canons of Judicial Ethics, or permanent mental or physical disability interfering with the proper performance of these duties.

No censure, removal, or retirement will be effective until the judicial officer has been served with written charges and has had the opportunity to be heard in accordance with due process of law.

The Court on the Judiciary has the power to:

- (a) summon witnesses to appear and testify under oath and to compel production of other evidence, and
- (b) adopt rules establishing procedures for the investigation and trial of a judicial officer.

JUDICIAL CONFERENCE

Legal Authorization

The Judicial Conference is authorized by Supreme Court Rule 35.

Duties

The Judicial Conference studies the judicial business of the courts with a view towards improving the administration of justice in the State. The Conference also considers improvements in procedure, considers and recommends legislation, considers and implements the canons of judicial ethics, and holds symposia of the Bench and Bar.

Membership

The membership of the Conference includes the members of the Supreme Court, Court of Chancery, Superior Court, Court of Common Pleas, Family Court, and the Municipal Court of Wilmington. The Chief Justice is presiding officer of the Conference. The Director of the Administrative Office of the Courts serves as secretary for the Conference. Scheduled meetings of the Conference are held on the first Wednesdays of December and June.

COUNCIL ON THE ADMINISTRATION OF JUSTICE

Legal Authorization

The Council on the Administration of Justice is authorized by 10 Delaware Code, § 2001-2008.

Duties

The Council is charged with the continuous study of the administration of justice in the State, and of the organization, procedure, practice, rules, and methods of administration and operation of each and all the courts of the State, whether of record or not of record. The Council collects and uses statistical and other information concerning the work of the courts and makes recommendations to the Governor, the General Assembly, the courts, or the bar.

Membership

There are 15 members including the Chief Justice, the Chancellor, the President Judge of Superior Court, the Speaker of the House, the President Pro Tem of the Senate, the Minority Leaders of the House and Senate, the Attorney General, the President of the Bar Association, the President of the University of Delaware, and five non-lawyers appointed by the Governor for a term coextensive with that of the appointing Governor. Projects Supported by Federal Funds

PROJECTS SUPPORTED BY FEDERAL FUNDS

During the past fiscal year, Delaware courts received continued federal support in the effort to improve the criminal justice system from the Delaware Criminal Justice Planning Commission (DCJPC), which is the state criminal justice planning agency (SPA) that administers the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration (LEAA) block grant allocation.

LEAA block grant funds were expended for the following purposes:

- 1. To provide computer terminals for the courts. LEAA funds enabled the courts to rent 7 computer terminals for the courts, 4 in Superior Court, 1 in Family Court, and 2 in the Justice of the Peace Courts. The terminals enabled these courts to access computerized criminal histories to aid the courts in bail and sentencing decisions. The criminal histories are housed in the state's main Central Data Processing computer in Dover. 2 of the 4 terminals in Superior Court were also used to perform the functions of the Courts' own information system.
- 2. To staff the Judicial Planning Committee. The Judicial Planning Committee (JPC) was created by Chief Justice Daniel L. Herrmann during December, 1976 in accordance with the provisions of PL 94-503, which reauthorized LEAA for a period of three years. The Chief Justice appointed the Honorable Vincent A. Bifferato, Associate Judge of Superior Court, to serve as Chairman. In addition, judges from each of the various courts were appointed along with the Attorney General, a representative of the Public Defender's Office, and the Director of the Administrative Office of the Courts. The mission of the JPC is to plan for the improvement of the Delaware courts, which includes planning for the utilization of federal block grant monies received through the Delaware Criminal Justice Planning Commission. The Administrative Office of the Courts received funds to employ a professional planning staff to the JPC. A planner, a research assistant, and a secretary have been hired. They must produce the Annual Judicial Plan and perform other administrative and planning functions as directed by the Administrative Office of the Courts.
- 3. To expand the Superior Court Case Scheduling Office. This subgrant funded a Data Entry/Calendaring Clerk to assist the Case Scheduling Office in Superior Court, New Castle County, particularly in entering data for an interim batch information system.
- 4. To establish an Arbitration Hearing Unit. This subgrant aided Family Court in continuing an Arbitration Unit. Federal funds add a hearing officer, 2 interview officers, and a clerk typist to 3 state-funded personnel (a hearing officer and 2 interview officers). The Arbitration Unit seeks to provide an arbitration mechanism for those first and second time offender juveniles and adults charged with misdemeanors, in order to divert defendants from further court involvement while still satisfying complainants and victims.

- 5. To provide a Case Coordinator. This subgrant enabled the Municipal Court to continue to employ the Case Coordinator, whose primary responsibility was to reduce the number of continuances in bringing cases to preliminary hearing or trial.
- 6. To staff the judiciary's computer center. State funds enabled the Administrative Office of the Courts to hire 2 computer programmers and a computer operator. This subgrant funded a Data Processing Manager and an additional computer operator. The Data Processing Manager provided the proper level of supervision and management to the computer center and the court computerization project. The second computer operator enabled the computer center to operate two shifts per day on weekdays.

LEAA also awarded four discretionary grants to the Delaware courts directly from Washington. These programs were as follows:

7. Comprehensive Data Systems (CDS)

3 systems analysts, 2 full-time and 1 part-time, were assigned to work with the Courts in the development of the courts module of the overall criminal justice information system. One analyst is dedicated to the information system for family and juvenile matters and is assigned to Family Court; two analysts are working on information requirements for adult criminal matters and are assigned to the Administrative Office of the Courts. The adult court analysts designed Superior Court first, followed by the Court of Common Pleas.

8. State Judicial Information System (SJIS), Phase I

LEAA provided the Delaware Judiciary with discretionary grant to aid in the development of its information system. This grant contained money to purchase a small computer and supporting software to house the court information system, plus funds to hire a consultant to design the civil portion of the system for all the courts. The grant also provided money for training of computer support personnel.

9. State Judicial Information System, Phase II

This one-year LEAA continuation grant of \$161,000 was awarded to the Administrative Office of the Courts on 8/9/79. The funding was provided to allow the AOC to hire a team of contract programmers to do data base design, program specifications, programming, and documentation for Superior Court, Family Court, and Court of Common Pleas criminal and juvenile delinquency cases.

10. Restitution Project

The Family Court "Restitution by Juvenile Offenders Project" is a two-year LEAA grant for over \$800,000. It became operational on 3/1/79. In this project, adjudicated juvenile offenders make monetary payment to the victim, provide direct service to the victim, or engage in community service. Each project juvenile is under the supervision of a project counselor in the court.

The Courts also received one grant from the federal Department of Health, Education, and Welfare.

11. Public Guardian Caseworkers

The Public Guardian was able to hire two social workers using federal Title XX, Social Security Act funds administered by the State Division of Social Services. These two staff persons provided assistance to the vast number of clients who are referred to the office of the Public Guardian but do not actually need a legal guardian. This service is offered in lieu of an adult protective service program, which the State does not have. By the terms of the contract, the two caseworkers may not provide assistance to anyone who becomes a ward of the Public Guardian. Services provided under the contract an intensive casework and counselling, including assessment of client needs, evaluation of client abilities to do for self, counselling, assisting clients in utilizing appropriate community resources, and long-term follow-up as necessary.

Court Rules Changes

COURT RULES CHANGES

The following additions, deletions, and amendments were made to the rules of Delaware's courts during Fiscal Year 1980. This material represents a synopsis of the changes, rather than verbatim copies of the changes themselves. The changes listed became effective between 7/1/79 and 6/30/80.

SUPREME COURT

Rule 2(b) (Effective 1/1/80)

This rule establishes seniority for judges of lower courts who are assigned to sit on the Supreme Court. The order is as follows:

1) Chancellor, 2) President Judge, and 3) Vice-Chancellors and Associate Judges. No seniority was heretofore in existence.

Rule 9(e) (iii) (Effective 1/1/80)

This rule lists the forms which may be used by the opposing parties in response to a notice of appeal or to the docketing of an appeal, and sets the time limits for the response. The amendment to the rule includes a requirement that this designation must be delivered by the attorney to the proper court reporter and as such represents a direction to have a transcript prepared of the parts of the record so designated.

Rule 14(b) (vi) (Effective 1/1/80)

This rule establishes the type of format which must be used in preparing a brief for the Supreme Court. It specifically requires that a statement of the standard of review applicable to each issue be included in the brief. The merits of the argument must also be included. Any unreported opinion which is cited necessitates adding a copy of said opinion to the brief, and it must be properly identified and applied to the case before the Court.

Rule 14(d) (Effective 1/1/80)

This rule sets the maximum page limits on opening and answering briefs at 35 and 20 pages respectively. The rule specifically mentions the materials which must and must not be included in calculating the total number of pages in the brief.

Rule 17 (Effective 1/1/80)

All written opinions by the Supreme Court must include mention of the names of the attorneys who were involved in the oral argument.

Rule 17(a) (Effective 3/1/80)

This rule establishes circumstances by which the Supreme Court can dispose of a case in a manner other than by written opinion (e.g., written order). The Court may do so only if the decision will serve no precedential merit; and,

- 1) the issue being appealed is controlled by Delaware law;
- 2) the issue on appeal is factual and there is enough evidence to support the previous jury verdict or findings of fact below; or
- 3) the issue on appeal is one of judicial discretion and the record shows no abuse of discretion.

Rule 30(e) (Effective 1/1/80)

This amendment serves to correct a typographical error made in reference to Rule 15 (originally listed incorrectly as Rule 11). The purpose of the rule itself is unchanged.

Rule 42(c) (ii) (Effective 1/1/80)

Amended Rule 42(d) (ii) sets the time limits for: 1) filing an application for interlocutory appeals (10 days); 2) filing of a response by the opposing party to the application; and, 3) decision by the Court if it is certify on decline the interlocutory appeal (not more than 20 days after filing of the application).

Rule 42(c) (iv) (Effective 1/1/80)

This rule permits the filing of a response to a notice of appeal, giving a time limit of 10 days from the service of the notice of appeal.

Rule 42(c) (vii) (Effective 1/1/80)

Rules for further proceedings after acceptance of an interlocutory appeal are set here. They include two sections which determine that the trial court must retain the record unless the record is needed to

help dispose of the appeal.

Rule 43(b) (ii) (Effective 1/1/80)

This amendment clarifies what a respondent may include in his answer to a complaint involving an extraordinary writ. The amendment permits the assertion of certain responses to the complaint. This answer must be filed within 10 days of the service of the complaint.

Rule 43(b) (iii) (Effective 1/1/80)

This rule deals with the time allowed for the complainant to submit an opening brief after service of the answer. The general time limit is 30 days after service of the answer, but in those answers in which there is a motion or other defense seeking dismissal or denial of the complaint, the opening brief will be due 30 days after the Court has decided against dismissal.

Rule 43(b) (vi) (Effective 1/1/80)

This amendment requires that applications for extraordinary writs which are directed to the statutory Courts or to the Justice of the Peace Courts must first be made to Superior Court. Only after such a presentation has been denied by Superior Court may a complaint be issued to any of these Courts.

Rule 67(a) (vii) (C) (Effective 1/1/80)

This amendment increased the insurance limits permitted by a professional service corporation composed solely of attorneys for the practice of law. The minimums were increased from \$50,000 per claim to \$250,000 per claim and the maximum aggregate annual liability permitted was increased from \$150,000 to \$750,000.

Rule 69(a) (ii) (Effective 1/1/80)

This increased the annual registration fee required to retain membership in the Delaware Bar from \$5 to \$10.

COURT OF CHANCERY

Rule 59(f) (Effective 10/23/79)

This amended rule establishes the 5-day deadline for submitting a motion for reargument after the Court's opinion is filed or the Court's decision is received. The motion to reargue must "set forth briefly and distinctly the grounds...." After service of this motion, the opposing party has 5 days to file a short answer to each ground asserted to the motion.

Rule 132 (Effective 7/1/79)

This rule deals with fiduciary commissions, setting annual charges on gross income for Income Commissions and on the principal or corpus of the trust estate for Periodic Principal Commissions. Rules for other than annual charges are also established.

SUPERIOR COURT

Criminal Rule 5(c) (Effective 9/15/79)

The scheduling of preliminary hearings is laid out in this rule. It establishes the defendant's right to the hearing, where it is to be held, when it is to be held, and the reasons for which it may be extended.

Criminal Rule 15 (Effective 9/15/79)

This rule deals with the taking of depositions from a prospective witness. Such depositions may be taken when "due to exceptional circumstances it is in the interest of justice" to do so. Every party must be given reasonable notice. The costs will be paid by the State or County if the deposition is taken at their insistence or if the defendant cannot afford the expenses.

Civil Rule 107 (Effective 10/1/79)

This amendment establishes maximum lengths of 35 pages for an opening and 20 pages for a reply brief. These limits do not include the appendix and may be altered in certain cases by leave of the Court.

DELAWARE LAWYER'S CODE OF PROFESSIONAL RESPONSIBILITY

Disciplinary Rule 9-101(D) (Effective 1/1/80)

This amendment adds lawyers regularly performing defense services under contracts with any of the State counties, and any associates and partners of these lawyers to the list of lawyers who may not engage in the private practice of criminal law.

Disciplinary Rule 2-105 (Effective 9/15/79)

This amended rule determines when a lawyer may hold himself out as a specialist. He may do so only certain specified circumstances, such as an attorney permitted before the U.S. Patent and Trademark Office may be designated a "Patent Attorney". Any attorney involved in full-time practice who devotes not less than 25% of his entire practice time to a specific field of law may hold himself out as a lawyer whose practice is limited (at least primarily) to this field.

COURT ON THE JUDICIARY

Rule 3(a) (Effective 10/2/79)

This rule deals with the Preliminary Investigation Committee of the Court on the Judiciary. The amendment made the following changes:

- 1) Increased the number of members from 3 to 6:
- 2) Where previously all members had to be members of the Delaware Bar, it is now required that at least 4 of 6 members belong to the Delaware Bar;
- 3) There are now 2 committees of 3 members each; one deals with charges of misconduct by a Justice of the Peace and the other deals with charges of misconduct made against any other judicial officer.

Rule 3(g) (Effective 10/2/79)

This rule requires the Chief Justice to refer to the Committee for inquiry and report any accusations (though unofficial) of any misconduct or disability on his part upon the written request of any judicial officer.

Rule 10 (Effective 10/2/79)

This amendment adds a notation that any of the rules in Rule 10, entitled "Miscellaneous", may be suspended for a specific case by a special order of the Court.

Legislation

LEGISLATION

The following legislation was enacted during 1980 by the Delaware General Assembly.

SENATE

Senate Bill 167 (Sponsor, Senator Anthony J. Cicione)

This bill, signed into law on 6/27/80, deals with costs for civil proceedings in the Justice of the Peace Courts. The bill changed the court costs for receipt, issuance, and process of a civil action from \$15 to \$16. Also, a \$2 charge was established for the issuance of a civil subpoena. The cost for mailing a subpoena must equal the prevailing mail rates.

Senate Bill 212 (Sponsor, Senator Francis J. Kearns)

This constitutional amendment passed the first leg when it was approved on 5/22/80. This amendment adds a new section (to be designated as § 38) to Article IV of the Delaware Constitution. This section would permit the temporary return to judicial duty of former Superior Court Judges, Court of Chancery Chancellors or Vice-Chancellors, and State Supreme Court Justices. They would be permitted to return to sit temporarily in that Court in which they had sat or any other Court to which he would be constitutionally and statutorily qualified. The upcoming General Assembly must also approve the amendment for it to become law.

Senate Bill 477 (Sponsors, Senators Thomas B. Sharp and Daniel E. Weiss)

This constitutional amendment passed its first leg on 6/24/80. To become law, it must be approved by the next General Assembly. The amendment changes the New Castle County Sheriff's term from 2 years to 4 years and eliminates the prohibition against the New Castle County Sheriff succeeding himself. Kent and Sussex County Sheriffs still serve 2 year terms and may not succeed themselves.

Senate Bill 478 (Sponsors, Senators Daniel E. Weiss and Thomas B. Sharp)

This bill abolished mileage payments to the Sheriff of New Castle County and allows the New Castle County government to fix the Sheriff's salary, as long as the salary is not less than the lowest of the salaries of the Prothonotary, Register in Chancery, Register of Wills, and Recorder of Deeds. Kent County and Sussex County Sheriffs continue to have salaries fixed by State statute and continue to receive mileage fees. Senate Bill 478 was signed into law on 6/26/80.

Senate Bill 571 (Sponsors, Senators Robert J. Berndt, Francis J. Kearns, Andrew G. Knox, and Harris B. McDowell III)

This constitutional amendment passed the first leg when it was approved on 6/30/80. It must be approved by the incoming General Assembly in order for it to become law. This amendment deals with Article IV, Section 28 of the Delaware Constitution, which requires a two-thirds majority in each House before a change may be made in the criminal jurisdiction of any of the statutorally-created courts or of the Justice of the Peace Courts. This amendment would delete the two-thirds vote requirement.
