

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MESSAGE FROM
Chief Justice
Collins J. Seitz, Jr.

On behalf of the Court, I am pleased to present our 2025 Annual Report.

A Few Highlights from 2025:

- The Court of Chancery completed its expanded Magistrate in Chancery bench. The Court now has seven full-time Magistrates in Chancery.
- This past year, the Governor nominated, and the Senate confirmed new judicial officers to every trial court.
- We are in the final stages of a courthouse building and rehabilitation campaign across our state to improve and enhance court facilities. We opened our new Family Court courthouse in Georgetown in November. Its sister Family Court facility in Dover will open this summer and the Custom House renovation and expansion in Wilmington will not be far behind.
- The Judicial Branch conducted its first-ever statewide security review of judicial facilities. The top to bottom review generated recommendations that we will work to implement as soon as practical.
- The five-year CASCADE project is well underway to move all courts to a single, modern electronic filing, case management and document management system.
- Under the leadership of Executive Director Betsy Renzo, Delaware Law Related Education Center (DELREC), continues its important outreach and educational efforts with schools across the state, expanding their work in Kent and Sussex counties.
- Finally, starting July 1, 2025, I began a one-year term as the President of the Conference of Chief Justices and Chair of the Board of the National Center for State Courts. I follow in the footsteps of former Chief Justices Veasey and Steele to lead these organizations through challenging times.

There is always more work to do, but the future has never been brighter for Delaware’s Judicial Branch. Our success would not be possible without the hard work and dedication of our judicial officers, court staff, and justice partners. Thank you for your public service.



THE DELAWARE COURT SYSTEM



The Delaware Judicial Branch consists of the Supreme Court, the Court of Chancery, the Superior Court, the Family Court, the Court of Common Pleas, the Justice of the Peace Court, the Administrative Office of the Courts, and related non-judicial agencies.

Supreme Court

- Court of Last Resort
- Final appellate jurisdiction for most criminal cases, civil cases, certain orders of the Court of Chancery, the Superior Court, and Family Court
- Issuer of certain writs
- Jurisdiction over questions of law certified to the courts

Court of Chancery

- Equity Court
- Hears all cases in equity (typically corporate, trust, fiduciary matters, land sale, real estate, and commercial/contractual matters)
- Certain guardianship cases

Superior Court

- Law Court
- Original statewide jurisdiction over all criminal and civil cases (except equity)
- Exclusive jurisdiction over nearly all felonies and drug offenses
- Intermediate appellate court from Court of Common Pleas, Family Court (adult criminal) and various state agencies, boards and commissions

Family Court

- Legal and equitable jurisdiction over all domestic relations cases, including divorce, custody, guardianships, adoptions, visitation, child and spousal support, and property division
- Jurisdiction over all juvenile offenses except certain serious offenses

Court of Common Pleas

- All criminal misdemeanors (except certain drug offenses) and motor vehicle offenses (except felonies)
- Responsible for preliminary hearings
- Statewide jurisdiction in civil actions that do not exceed \$75,000
- Appeals from the Justice of the Peace Court, Alderman's Court and Division of Motor Vehicles

Justice of the Peace Court

- Statewide jurisdiction over civil cases that do not exceed \$25,000
- Jurisdiction over certain misdemeanors and motor vehicle cases (except felonies)
- Jurisdiction over landlord/tenant (possession) cases
- Generally sets bail in most cases





Appropriated Special Funds (ASF) are derived from fees that are collected and designated for a specific purpose. Most court collections listed in the table on page 12 support programs outside of the Judicial Branch.

There are additional ASF revenues which are indirectly associated with fines and fees, primarily civil. Specifically, there is an ASF line called "Judicial Services" for \$2,050,000 in FY 2025, which was appropriated in connection with a previous increase in fees. Most of those fees were Civil, although there is one fee which can be either Civil or Criminal.

Section 1 and Section 42 of the FY 2025 Budget Act (SB 325 of the 152nd General Assembly) appropriated ASF funds to the Court of Chancery and the Court of Common Pleas through the budget process; those funds, however, are not tied to specific fees. The Court of Chancery fines and fees are civil, and the Court of Common Pleas fines and fees may be civil or criminal. These funds are not included in the table above as they are not directly tied to any criminal collections.

The above represents the criminal court collections from our criminal courts: Superior Court, Family Court, Court of Common Pleas, the Justice of the Peace Court and the OSCCE. Much of the above is not technically defined as court revenue, but rather as revenue for the State or other entities which is collected by the courts. Definitions below are not intended to be all-inclusive.

Fines: Includes state fines, town fines, criminal fines, DUI fines, and forensic fines.

Fees and Costs: Includes court costs, extradition, kiosks, Public Defender fees, and capiases. Assessments of certain fees, such as the kiosk fee, the Public Defender fee, and the Voluntary Assessment Center late and e-payment fees, were eliminated upon the effective date of HB 244 w/ HA 2 of the 151st General Assembly.

Assessments: Includes Court Security, Senior Trust Fund, Victim Rights, Victim Compensation, Drug Ed/Rehab Substance Abuse (SARTEP), Civil Penalty/ Drug Diversion Fees, Transportation Trust Fund Surcharge, Voluntary Ambulance Fund, the DELJIS Fund, the Videophone Fund, and the Fund to Combat Violent Crime. The Senior Trust fee and the SARTEP fee were eliminated upon the effective date of SB 282 of the 152nd General Assembly.

Revenues for the Volunteer Ambulance Company Fund and the Fund to Combat Violent Crimes (Local) are pass throughs for State agencies or commissions to municipalities or local entities. They are reported under "Counties/Municipalities including Statutory Funds".



Supreme Court

The Supreme Court is the State's appellate court which receives direct appeals from the Court of Chancery, the Superior Court, and the Family Court. As administrative head of the courts, the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, in consultation with the other justices, sets administrative policy for the court system. The Supreme Court was created by the Constitution of Delaware, Article IV, Section 1. The Supreme Court sits in Dover.



2025 Highlights



- On 1/30/25, Jessica L. Tyler was appointed Chief Disciplinary Counsel of the Office of Disciplinary Counsel, an Arm of the Delaware Supreme Court. Prior to this post, Tyler served as Deputy Disciplinary Counsel for three years.


- On 4/7/25, the Delaware Board of Bar Examiners announced it will begin using the new NextGen Bar Exam in Feb. 2028, becoming the 39th state to announce it would adopt the new test.

- On 5/22/25, the court created a task force to assess alternative pathways to admission to the Delaware Bar. The task force, headed by Justice Gary F. Traynor, broadly represents Delaware's legal community including representatives from both the public and private bar, legal aid groups and local law schools. The group's report is due to the Chief Justice in June 2026.

- On 9/30/2025, Chief Justice Collins J. Seitz, Jr., along with Vice Chancellor Paul Fioravanti and Senior Magistrate in Chancery Selena Molina, spoke to a class of about 20 students from the University of Delaware's Biden School of Public Policy, about the importance of public service and working for the courts.



- After nearly 30 years of dedicated service to the State of Delaware and the Delaware Judiciary, Patricia Bartley Schwartz retired from her position as Executive Director of the Board of Bar Examiners at the end of 2025.




Number of Supreme Court Filings by Court of Origination Fiscal Year 2025




Average Number of Days from Filing to Disposition by Case Type

The Court on the Judiciary is responsible for the receipt, investigation, prosecution, adjudication, and resolution of complaints alleging the ethical misconduct or disability of state judicial officers in Delaware. The judicial disciplinary process safeguards the integrity of, and thereby promotes public confidence in, the Judiciary and the judicial process.

Arms of the Supreme Court

Commission on Law and Technology

The commission develops and publishes guidelines and best practices regarding the use of technology and the practice of law. The commission was created by order of the Supreme Court on July 1, 2013, and became effective on Sept. 15, 2013. The Delaware Supreme Court then re-established and re-focused the commission by order on Nov. 27, 2023. The commission is composed of members who are appointed by the Court and serve three-year terms.



Lawyers' Fund for Client Protection

The Lawyers' Fund for Client Protection is a fund created by the Delaware Supreme Court to provide monetary relief to clients who have suffered financial losses as a result of the dishonest conduct of lawyers. While acts of attorney dishonesty are the exceptions and not the rule, the fund was established to show the good faith of all members of the Delaware Bar.



Commission on Continuing Legal Education (CLE)

The commission regulates legal education compliance for members of the Delaware State Bar. In addition, the commission reviews and processes CLE providers' applications for program approval.





Board of Bar Examiners

The board considers applications for admission and results of examinations for admissions to the Delaware State Bar. The Delaware Bar Examination consists of the Multistate Bar Examination, two Multistate Performance Tests and four essay questions. In addition, applicants must also pass the Multistate Professional Responsibility Examination.



2025 Highlights

- Attorney Gregory Birney was presented with the Court of Chancery's Annual Award for Attorney ad litem service to the Court on 12/3/24.
- The Honorable Bonnie W. David, who had been serving as a Magistrate in Chancery, became a Vice Chancellor on 1/7/25.
- For the fifth year, the court welcomed high school interns participating in the Delaware Department of State's Future Leaders Internship Initiative ("FLii").
- The Court welcomed Christopher D. Renaud as the Court's new Chief Staff Attorney on 10/20/25.

• The Court completed its expansion of the Magistrate in Chancery Bench to seven full-time judicial officers, welcoming: David Hume, IV on 2/10/25; Caroline Brittingham on 9/8/25 and Jessie R. Benavides on 9/22/25. The Chancellor also announced the elevation of Magistrate in Chancery Selena Molina to the newly created title of Senior Magistrate Judge on 1/2/25 formalizing the leadership role she has informally held over the past few years.





- Vice Chancellor Paul A. Fioravanti, Jr. held a Special Session at historic New Castle Court House Museum in Old New Castle, helping that historic building maintain its claim as one of the oldest continually operating courthouses in the nation on 9/19/24.
- The Court of Chancery Historical Society hosted a celebration of the 40th Anniversary of the Hostile Takeover Era at the Chase Center on 11/11/25. This event included an afternoon of CLE presentations focused on important Chancery decisions from the 1980s, followed by a cocktail reception and dinner. The Historical Society hosted the event as a celebration of the legacy of the court, including some of the judges and practitioners involved in those seminal cases.
- The Court continued with its ongoing effort to update, modernize and improve court rules and processes including revising Sample Confidentiality and Quick Peek Stipulations; updating Guidelines for Litigants; updating guidelines for requesting special designation of judicial officers; amending rules 143 and 144; updates to the e-filing system; and creating a new process for handling routine civil actions.
- The Court held its Third Annual Student Legal History Art Contest in 2025. The contest winners included: Nevaeh Rumbley, 17 of Dover High School, who won the \$500 first-place prize for her work, "Next Stop... Hopes and Dreams!"; Sarah Emily Falu, 17, of Polytech High School and her work "Louis Redding is a Pioneer for Equal Rights" and Sharon Rodney, 15, of Early College School at Delaware State University and her work "Shattering the Color Line" both won the \$300 second-place prize; and Onna Parrish, 16 of Appoquinimink High School won the \$200 third-place prize for her untitled work "Untitled."






Filings by Type Fiscal Year 2025

The Superior Court, the State's court of general jurisdiction, has original jurisdiction over criminal and civil cases except equity cases. The Court has exclusive jurisdiction over felonies and almost all drug offenses. In civil matters, the Court's authority to award damages is not subject to a monetary maximum. The Superior Court also serves as an intermediate appellate court by hearing appeals on the record from the Court of Common Pleas, the Family Court (in criminal cases), and a number of administrative agencies. Appeals from the Superior Court may be taken to the Supreme Court.


2025 Highlights

- Superior Court welcomed the Honorable Eric M. Davis as its new President Judge on April 17, 2025. President Judge Davis previously served on the Court of Common Pleas from 2010-2012 and joined Superior Court in 2012.
- Superior Court also welcomed the Honorable Sonia Augusthy on May 16, 2025, and Judge Monica A. Horton on June 26, 2025. Judge Augusthy was with the Office of Defense Services before being nominated as a Superior Court Judge and Judge Horton was with the Court of Common Pleas before being nominated as a Superior Court Judge.
- Superior Court continues to see case filings increase in its Complex Commercial Litigation Division ("CCLD"). In Fiscal Year 2024 there were 223 CCLD cases filed. In Fiscal Year 2025 the filings increased by 40 to 273. This in part has been driven by the February 2023 cross designation order from the Chief Justice allowing CCLD to take on breach of contract cases from the Court of Chancery where damages are sought. Since that time, CCLD Judges have closed 43 Section 111 cases, while 65 remain pending and three have been stayed.
- Superior Court is working to implement new probation standards in the wake of the enactment of Senate Bill 7 (Probation Reform) on July 1, 2025. The act instructs the courts, the Board of Parole, and the Bureau of Community Corrections to use the least restrictive probation and parole conditions and the most minimally intrusive reporting requirements necessary to achieve the goals of community supervision. The legislation is effective December 28, 2025.
- Superior Court is also working to implement Senate Bill 10 (Compassionate Release) that was enacted on July 14, 2025. This act, named for Richard "Mouse" Smith, removes the Board of Parole from the sentence modification process, thereby allowing the Department of Correction and incarcerated individuals, themselves or through their legal counsel, to apply directly to the sentencing court for modifications. Superior Court is coordinating with the Department of Correction to facilitate a seamless rollout of this new process. This legislation is effective January 10, 2026.
- As part of the Automatic Mandatory Expungement statute ("Clean Slate"), Superior Court has been working to identify and review criminal cases where dispositions were unknown, unobtainable or pending in the Court's records. This project was undertaken to permit eligible criminal cases to proceed through Clean Slate. To date, approximately 10,000 criminal case records have been reviewed using this process. Superior Court continues to work on this effort to permit additional criminal cases to be available for expungement. Beginning in August 2024 through September 2025, Superior Court completed 401 Clean Slate expungements, with 298 in New Castle County; 62 in Kent County; and 41 in Sussex County.

Number of Superior Court Filings by Type Fiscal Year 2025




Number of Superior Court Criminal Dispositions by Method Fiscal Year 2025



Number of Superior Court Criminal Filings by Type Fiscal Year 2025




Number of Superior Court Civil Filings by Type Fiscal Year 2025



In Memoriam

Superior Court Judge John E. Babiarz, Jr.

The Delaware Judiciary mourned the passing of retired Superior Court Judge John E. Babiarz, Jr. on July 30, 2025.

Judge Babiarz, 83, served on Superior Court from 1985 to 2010.




“John was intelligent, quick-witted, kind and generous. He was a larger-than-life presence on the Court for many years and a great colleague. He will be dearly missed,” said Superior Court President Judge Eric M. Davis.

Judge Babiarz, a Delaware native and graduate of Salesianum High School, joined the Delaware Bar in 1966 after graduating from Harvard Law School. Prior to joining the bench, he was in private practice and formed the law firm Biondi and Babiarz in 1971. In 1979, he became a partner at Morris, Nichols, Arsht & Tunnell where he worked until his appointment to Superior Court. On the bench he had a reputation as a fiercely independent jurist, neither consistently favoring defense nor the prosecution. He was the son of former Wilmington Mayor John Babiarz and was particularly pleased that during most of his judicial career he worked in the Daniel L. Herrmann Courthouse on Rodney Square, which was the same building where his father had his office during his time as mayor.

While serving on the bench, Judge Babiarz said the great strength of Delaware’s legal community was the sense of decorum and mutual respect among members of the Delaware Bar.

Shortly after he was nominated in 1985, Judge Babiarz said that being a judge was the best job he ever had, adding, “I can’t wait for tomorrow to come.” And 25 years later, on the eve of his retirement, he remained as enthusiastic about being a judge as the day he took office. “I look forward to coming to work every day,” he said.



The Family Court has extensive jurisdiction over virtually all family and juvenile matters. All civil appeals, including those relating to juvenile delinquency, go directly to the Supreme Court while adult criminal cases are appealed to the Superior Court. The Constitution of Delaware, Article IV, Section 1, establishes the Family Court.


2025 Highlights

- The new Sussex County Family Court building in Georgetown opened to the public in November 2025. This is an important milestone for Family Court and the citizens of Sussex County. Many months of detailed planning ensured a smooth transition to the new facility with minimal disruption to public facing services.
- Family Court continues to work with construction teams on completion of the new Kent County Family Court courthouse in Dover, expected to open in the summer of 2026.
- Family Court welcomed the Honorable Jennifer Donahue, as a fourth Judge now assigned to Sussex County on 6/18/25.
- Family Court also welcomed three new commissioners: the Honorable Meghann O. Karasic in New Castle County on 4/17/25, the Honorable Mary E. Batten in Sussex County on 6/25/25, and the Honorable Elizabeth Fillingame in New Castle County on 7/11/25.
- The court worked on new processes to effectuate service in civil cases, with a focus on a process that provides optimal customer service and early interaction with judicial officers. This effort also led to numerous “blitz” calendars to move cases forward that had been awaiting service.
- The court continued with its training efforts for new staff and supervisors and has continued to improve its onboarding process to set new staff up for success.
- Family Court experienced a substantial increase in expungements this last fiscal year, over 3,400 more than FY 24, or a 145% increase.
- Family Court’s PFA Compliance Calendar continued to grow this fiscal year with 79 more entries into the program than last fiscal year. This calendar remains a specialized calendar in all three counties that was created to increase engagement and completion of domestic violence intervention treatment by PFA respondents ordered to have a domestic violence evaluation. There are currently over 200 cases in the program, and it is a critical effort to help address domestic violence in Delaware.
- Family Court has focused on training new members of the court’s Administrative Team throughout 2025, as several new members have joined the team in key leadership positions. This is a lengthy process, given the depth and breadth of Family Court’s jurisdiction.


Number of Family Court Filings by Type Fiscal Year 2025




Number of Family Court Filings by County Fiscal Year 2025







Criminal Caseload Trend by Fiscal Year





Justice of the Peace Court

The Justice of the Peace Court has jurisdiction over civil cases involving debt, trespass and replevin in which the amount in controversy does not exceed \$25,000.

The Justice of the Peace Court has jurisdiction over all landlord/tenant summary possession proceedings. Justice of the Peace Court is authorized to hear certain misdemeanors and most motor vehicle cases (excluding felonies) and may act as committing magistrates for all crimes. The Justice of the Peace Court handles more than 90 percent of initial presentments/arraignments and warrants statewide.






2025 Highlights

- In February 2025, the State of Delaware Judicial Pension was implemented for Justice of the Peace Court Magistrates. The plan was previously in place for the Justice of the Peace Court Chief Magistrate and all judges in the higher courts and this move brings equity for all judicial officers in the Delaware courts and will improve the hiring and retention of judges at the Justice of the Peace Court.
- The Civil Mediation Unit moved into its new leased location at 113 Neurology Way, Milford, Kent County. The unit was created by legislation in 2023 that required the Justice of the Peace Court to establish and administer a residential eviction diversion program to facilitate dispute resolution between landlords and tenants. The facility provides administrative office space for the unit and may be used by the public for scheduled mediation meetings.
- Civil case filings increased an additional 17% in Fiscal Year 2025 over FY 2024. To manage the growing number of cases, the court has created a statewide Civil Intake Unit to more efficiently review and accept cases filed electronically. Initially the unit is handling civil debt cases with plans to expand to handle all types of civil cases filed in the court.
- Court 13 in New Castle, the highest volume civil court location for the Justice of the Peace Court in the state, has been challenged by a backlog of Landlord Tenant filings since COVID. To address the backlog, the court used resources from civil locations throughout the state, including dedicating a senior judge to the project; reviewed and revised processes, such as the use of virtual or in-person hearings; and focused staff efforts to optimize efficiencies and reduced the backlog.
- Court 20 will be moving from the Leonard L. Williams Justice Center to make room for Delaware Chancery Court expansion. The new location at 824 North Market Street is scheduled to be fully renovated for move in by early 2026.




- The Justice of the Peace Court is celebrating the 60th Anniversary of the court joining the Delaware State Court system. The legislation creating the modern Justice of the Peace Court was signed into law on March 31, 1965, by Governor Charles L. Terry and commemorated on March 31, 2025, with a special proclamation signed by Governor Matt Meyer.


JUSTICE OF THE PEACE COURT

Justice of the Peace Court Civil and Criminal/Traffic Filings and Dispositions by Fiscal Year*







Community Court

The Wilmington Community Court grant-funded initiative is an innovative effort by the Delaware Judiciary to break the cycle of crime before it starts by focusing on treatment and solving problems while ensuring public safety. Defendants are held accountable for their actions, but rather than using only incarceration or fines, community court looks to address the underlying issues that drive low-level, non-violent criminal behavior like drug addiction, mental health issues or unemployment, and connects defendants with needed services.

Wilmington Community Court's focus has narrowed to certain zip codes in Wilmington to increase collaboration between community partners and stakeholders such as the Treatment Access Center (TASC), West End Neighborhood House, Friendship House, and others. Cases are seen through the Court of Common Pleas and referrals are accepted from both Justice of the Peace Court and Court of Common Pleas.

Law Libraries

The Law Libraries provide legal research and information assistance to the Delaware Judiciary and access to print and digital legal research tools to members of the bar and the general public. There is one court law library in each of the state’s three counties. Currently, around half of those using the libraries and their services are those representing themselves in the Delaware Court system. The Law Libraries have been serving the Delaware Judiciary since 1911.

Limited Legal Assistance Program

Volunteer attorneys meet with eligible self-represented litigants for a one-time, fifteen-minute meeting. The attorney will not meet with the self-represented litigant outside of the program, nor will the attorney represent the litigant in court.

There is no income eligibility for this service. Instead, to be eligible, people seeking assistance must not have received previous legal assistance regarding the same issue and their question must be one that can be asked and answered within the fifteen-minute time frame. People using the service will be directed to legal service providers and reference materials for further assistance.

The Office of State Court Collections Enforcement (OSCCE) pursues the collection of court-ordered financial assessments through a variety of state and private sector sanctions to ensure the enforcement of Judicial Branch orders. These orders may include, but are not limited to, restitution, statutory surcharges, fines and court costs.

Judicial Information Center

The mission of the Judicial Information Center is to provide strategic IT vision, leadership, and enterprise solutions to the Judicial Branch and its customers, ensuring efficient operations and secure, reliable, and timely access to information.

Over the past year JIC's CASCADE Initiative to move all courts to a centralized E-Filing, Case Management, Document Management and Reporting system has marked several important milestones:

- The Problem-Solving Court application launched in Sept. 2025.
- Civil Case Management 0.2.0 release was implemented in December of 2025.
- The CASCADE Initiative remains on time and in budget.




Interpreter Services

JUDICIAL BRANCH EMPLOYEES RECOGNIZED

Sharay Knight – Judicial Branch Employee of the Year for 2024



Sharay Knight, a Judicial Case Manager 1 for the Court of Chancery, has been an employee of the branch since 2022 and was cited for her stellar customer service. Litigants who have worked with her praised her for her dedication and assistance that sometimes extended beyond regular court hours. When asked why she would take on additional work she simply replied, “Because it’s for the court.”

Knight’s industriousness has been particularly helpful at a time of high caseloads and staffing shortages downstate. “Sharay has proven willing to do whatever it takes to get the job done in a timely and professional manner. Sharay is a pleasure to be around and goes above and beyond her day-to-day responsibilities to ensure that the court is accessible to all,” wrote her nominator.

While there is supposed to be a one-to-one staffing ratio between case managers and judicial officers, Knight works for two judicial officers, assisted for a third, and after a staffing change, helped out with a fourth. “She did so without being asked and while continuing with her own responsibilities,” wrote her nominator. She keeps things running smoothly and efficiently and has impressed all who work with her – litigants, colleagues and judicial officers – with her “contribution and dedication to the mission of the Court of Chancery.”

OTHER NOMINEES

Melissa Peters, Judicial Operations Manager, Justice of the Peace Court – Peters took on the challenge of the transfer of a court to a new location in February of this year. “She increased accountability, knowledge, coaching, and most importantly, morale,” wrote her nominator.

Brian Bashkow, Judicial Case Manager III, Prothonotary’s Office, Superior Court – Bashkow was praised as an exceptional case manager in the Prothonotary’s Office, most notably to Superior Court Judge Eric Davis, during the *Dominion v. Fox News* litigation, arguably the largest case Superior Court has ever handled. “Brian is known as being a great co-worker, always offering assistance, and in general an all-around wonderful person,” wrote his nominator.

Amber Durr, Senior Investigative Services Officer, Court of Common Pleas – Durr, who has been with the court since 2013, has consistently gone above and beyond her designated duties, making significant contributions in pre-sentence investigations and court reporting efforts among others. Her nominator wrote that Durr’s contributions to the judicial system statewide “have been immeasurable.”

Ashley Tucker, Deputy State Court Administrator, Administrative Office of the Courts – Tucker was praised for her unmatched work ethic and dedication. “Large or small, Ashley is instrumental in nearly every project the AOC is working on. Not only is she a ‘go to’ for legal matters, but she is also a ‘go to’ for everything else,” wrote her nominator. Her work on a statewide security audit and accessibility issues during this past year were also highlighted.

Meghan McCarthy, Mediation Unit Supervisor, Family Court – McCarthy, who has been with the court since 2016, was praised as “a subject matter expert in all things mediation” and a great resource to other managers and judicial officers. She was also praised for her high standards and customer service. “Meghan is an exemplary public servant,” her nominator wrote.



















A civil filing is defined as one petition or one single civil incident filed with the Family Court. In a divorce matter, although the petition may contain multiple ancillary matters to the divorce, it is counted as only one filing.

A civil filing categorized as a "Case with Ancillary" is defined as a divorce with at least one ancillary, although the petition may contain multiple ancillary matters to the divorce, it is counted as only one filing. These were first counted in SFY2023. Ancillaries have always been a filing type; however, these were not included in prior years' filing counts.

For example, if a divorce is filed with a property division ancillary and a temporary alimony ancillary, it is counted once under the "Divorce" category and once under the "Cases with Ancillary" category.

Beginning in January 2024, some civil cases that originated in Kent and Sussex Counties were being handled by New Castle Judges as part of an effort to equitably distribute cases across all of Family Court's Judges. This process concluded in April 2025.

A criminal or delinquency filing is defined as one incident filed against one individual or defendant. A single criminal or juvenile delinquency filing may be comprised of a single or multiple charges relating to a single incident.

During the course of reviewing the SFY2024 report, it was discovered that Juvenile Truancy, Juvenile Civil Citations, and Juvenile Violations were not consistently being counted when these statutes represent the first charge sequence. Family Court worked with the Judicial Information Center to correct these incongruities for the SFY2024 report and moving forward. As part of this correction, it was decided that Adult Truancy would be broken out from the 'All Other Charges' section to remain consistent with the Juvenile section.


Mediation is the process prior to adjudication in which a trained mediator attempts to assist the parties in reaching an agreement. If the parties are unable to reach an agreement or the mediation does not occur as scheduled, the matter is scheduled to be heard before a Commissioner or Judge or rescheduled back to a mediation calendar.

Custody, support, visitation, determination of parentage, guardianship, imperiling family relations, and rule to show cause filings are scheduled for mediation unless bypass mediation rules apply as indicated in 13 Del. C. § 711A and 13 Del. C. § 728A; Family Court Procedures OCI-914 and OCI-902.

Automatic Expungements/Pardons resulting in Automatic Juvenile Expungements are counted as filings in this report due to the amount of staff effort to process them. Although there is not a disposition from a Hearing Officer for Automatic Expungements, the directive letter from SBI is acted upon by our staff. Therefore, the resolution of these types of filings are added to the same month they are received in the Disposition sections of this report.

Due to expungements, Delinquency and Criminal Filing/Disposition stats were taken from reports ran each month throughout the year. While this method will not catch all filing and dispositions that may have been expunged, this is the method that will allow us to capture the most. The volume of expungements will affect all data regarding juvenile criminal charges. Any decreases from prior FYs should not be assumed to be actual decreases as we don't have a definitive way to measure the impact of all the charges immediately expunged. The Expungement filing has gone up by 145% from FY24 to FY25 due to Clean Slate Initiative.

FY 2020 through FY 2024 Stats were most likely impacted by the worldwide COVID-19 pandemic and changes from past or future years should consider this impact.



Court of Common Pleas 10-Year Civil Caseload Trend









JP Court 10-Year Civil Caseload Trend






