



Administrative Office of the Courts

Legal Authorization

The Administrative Office of the Courts was established by 10 Delaware Code, Chapter 1, during the 1971 General Assembly.

Duties

The Administrative Office of the Courts serves as the focal point for coordination and communications concerning all court administrative activities in the judicial system. The office prepares budgets for the Supreme Court, Court of Chancery, and the Foster Care Review Board, and assists in preparation of the budgets of the Public Guardian and the Law Libraries. It administers the payment of all jurors and witnesses. The AOC is largely responsible for the acquisition of space or facilities for the judicial system, and is responsible for the supervision of lease negotiations and the payment of all rentals. It has primary responsibility for the acquisition, supervision, and administration of federal funds received to assist the court system. The Administrative Office of the Courts has responsibility for the development and maintenance of the computerized judicial information system. Also, the AOC acts as the focal point between the court system and other government agencies on the local, state, and federal levels. The AOC will implement and manage the upcoming judicial personnel system. The Administrative Office of the Courts collects statistics from the various courts and produces the Annual Report of the Judiciary. The AOC also performs other duties as prescribed by the Chief Justice.

Personnel

The Director of the Administrative Office of the Courts is appointed by and serves at the pleasure of the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of the State of Delaware.

The Director may, with the approval of the Chief Justice, appoint such assistants and clerical personnel as are required.

Supreme Court

Authorization

The Supreme Court is created by the Constitution of Delaware, Article IV, Section I. The Supreme Court has statewide jurisdiction and sits in Dover.

Jurisdiction

The Court has final appellate jurisdiction in criminal cases in which the sentence exceeds certain minimums and in civil cases as to final judgments and certain other orders of Superior Court, Court of Chancery, and Family Court. Appeals are heard on the record. The Supreme Court has jurisdiction to issue writs of prohibition, quo warranto, certiorari, and mandamus.

Justices

The Supreme Court consists of a Chief Justice and four Justices, who are appointed by the Governor with the consent of the Senate. The Justices are appointed for 12-year terms and must be learned in the law and citizens of the State. Three of the Justices must be of one of the major political parties while the other two Justices must be of the other major political party.

Administration

The Chief Justice is responsible for the administration of all courts in the State and appoints a Director of the Administrative Office of the Courts to manage the non-judicial aspects of court administration. The Supreme Court is staffed by a Clerk and Chief Deputy Clerk, law clerks, and secretaries.

Caseload Trend

A total of 337 criminal and civil cases were filed in FY 1981, 4 more than in FY 1980. The total of 348 dispositions in FY 1981 represents a 5.2% decrease from the 366 dispositions in FY 1980, which was an all-time high. As a result, the number of pending cases decreased for the third straight year, from 278 to 267 in FY 1981. The pending count is now at its lowest since the end of FY 1975. This may be attributed to the enlargement of the Court to 5 Justices. From filing to disposition, civil appeals were disposed of in an average of 281.4 days, criminal appeals in an average of 397.5 days, and other cases in an average of 191.7 days. The average of all cases combined was 315.5 days from filing to disposition, slightly more than the average of 313.0 days in FY 1980.



Court of Chancery

Legal Authorization

The Constitution of Delaware, Article IV, Section 1, authorizes the Court of Chancery.

Geographic Organization

The Court of Chancery holds court in Wilmington, Dover, and Georgetown; that is, at one location in each county in the county seat.

Legal Jurisdiction

The Court of Chancery has jurisdiction to hear and determine all matters and causes in equity. The general equity jurisdiction of the Court is measured in terms of the general equity jurisdiction of the High Court of Chancery of Great Britain as it existed prior to the separation of the American Colonies. The General Assembly may confer upon the Court of Chancery additional statutory jurisdiction. In today's practice, the litigation in the Court of Chancery consists largely of corporate matters, trusts, estates, and other fiduciary matters, disputes involving the purchase and sale of land, and the clearing of clouds on title, as well as commercial and contractual matters in general. When issues of fact to be tried by jury arise, the Court of Chancery may order such facts to trial by issues in Superior Court.

Judges

One Chancellor and two Vice-Chancellors hold the Court of Chancery. The Chancellor and Vice-Chancellors are appointed by the Governor with the consent of the majority of the Senate's elected members for 12 year terms. The Chancellor and Vice-Chancellors must be learned in the law and must be Delaware citizens.

Support Personnel

The Chancellor may appoint court reporters, bailiffs, criers or pages, and law clerks. The judges may appoint one Chief Deputy Register in Chancery in each county.

The Register of Wills acts as a Clerk of the Court of Chancery for probate matters. The majority of the Register's former judicial and quasi-judicial powers are now held by the Court of Chancery. A Register of Wills is elected in each county for that county. The Chancellor names a Chief Deputy Register of Wills for each county.

Public Guardian

The Chancellor has the duty to appoint the Public Guardian. The Public Guardian serves, when appointed by the Court, as the guardian of the person or property of the aged, the mentally infirm, and the physically incapacitated. Under the law, the Public Guardian is intended to be the guardian of last resort.

Caseload Trend

The number of cases handled by the Court of Chancery and the corresponding change from the previous fiscal year varied within the three categories of work handled by the Court of Chancery (civil cases, miscellaneous matters, and estates) during fiscal year 1981. The number of civil cases filed fell from 440 in FY 1980 to 424 in FY 1981, which was a decrease of 3.6%. The 594 miscellaneous matters filed in FY 1981 was an increase of 25 filings from the FY 1980 total of 569, representing an increase of 4.4%. The 1,874 estates filed in FY 1981 was a 6.7% increase from the 1,757 filings in FY 1980. Civil case dispositions increased from 384 in FY 1980 to 415 in FY 1981, an 8.1% rise; however, pending cases rose by 9 (1.2%) from 751 at the end of FY 1980 to 760 at the end of FY 1981. The number of miscellaneous matters disposed of decreased from 483 in FY 1980 to 452 in FY 1981, a drop of 6.4%. Because of this decrease in the number of miscellaneous matters disposed of, the net pending count rose 3.2% from 4,388 at the end of FY 1980 to 4,530 at the end of FY 1981. A 2.3% decrease in estates closed from 1,852 in FY 1980 to 1,809 in FY 1981 led to an increase of 2.7% in pending at the end of 1981 to 2,497 from the 2,432 estates pending at the end of FY 1980.







Public Guardian

Legal Authorization

The authority for the Office of the Public Guardian is derived from Title 12, § 3991, of the Delaware Code:

"There is established the Office of the Public Guardian. The Chancellor shall appoint the Public Guardian, who shall serve at his pleasure. The salary of the Public Guardian shall be \$18,500.00 per annum, to be paid from the General Fund. The Chancellor, in his discretion, may require the Public Guardian to post bond."

Geographic Organization

The Office of the Public Guardian has responsibility for the entire state and presents its petitions for guardianships in the Court of Chancery in all three counties.

Legal Jurisdiction

The powers and duties of the Public Guardian are spelled out in Title 12, \$ 3992, of the Delaware Code:

"The Public Guardian, when appointed as guardian by Court Order, shall:

- 1. Serve as a guardian for the property of aged, mentally or physically incapacitated persons, pursuant to § 3914 of this title;
- Serve as a guardian for the person of aged, mentally or physically incapacitated persons where such persons are in danger of substantially endangering their health, or of becoming subject to abuse by other persons, or of becoming the victim of designing persons; or,
- 3. Serve as both guardian of the person and of property of such person."

The intent of the legislation creating the Office of the Public Guardian was to create a guardianship capability for those situations in which a person needing a guardian does not have any relative, friend, or other person interested in or capable of serving as a guardian, whose estate is insufficient to purchase the services of a private guardian, or who would be best served by a neutral guardian.

Personnel

The Public Guardian is assisted by an administrative assistant and one caseworker.

Caseload

In the year of operation July 1, 1980 to June 30, 1981, the Office received 128 referrals. Of this number, 14 were determined to need the services of the Public Guardian as a guardian, and petitions were presented in the appropriate counties. As of June 30, 1981, the Public Guardian had responsibility for a total of 48 wards.

The remaining 114 cases were determined not to need guardianship for the solution of their problems and were served by mobilizing the resources of other state and private agencies to aid the client, involving the family of the client, helping the client to take some voluntary action on his own behalf, or simply offering counselling to help the client solve his own problems. About eighty-five percent of all individuals referred to the Office of the Public Guardian are in need of protective services rather than legal guardianship.

Superior Court

Legal Authorization

The Constitution of Delaware, Article IV, Section 1, created the Superior Court.

Geographic Organization

Sessions of Superior Court are held in each of the three counties at the county seat.

Legal Jurisdiction

Superior Court has statewide original jurisdiction over criminal and civil cases, except equity cases, over which the Court of Chancery has exclusive jurisdiction. The Court has exclusive jurisdiction over felonies and drug offenses (except most felonies and drug offenses involving minors and except possession of marijuana cases).

Superior Court has jurisdiction over adoptions and terminations of parental rights which were filed before September 9, 1980, and also over involuntary commitments of the mentally ill to the Delaware State Hospital. The Court serves as an intermediate appellate court, hearing appeals on the record from the Court of Common Pleas, Family Court, administrative agencies such as the Industrial Accident Board, Unemployment Insurance Appeal Board, Alcohol Beverage Control Commission, Tax Appeal Board, Zoning and Adjustment Boards, and other quasi-judicial bodies. Appeals from Alderman's Courts, Justice of the Peace Courts, and Municipal Court are heard as trials de novo (second trials) in Superior Court. Appeals from Superior Court are argued on the record before the Supreme Court.

Judges

Number: There are eleven judges appointed to the Superior Court bench; one is appointed President Judge with administrative responsibility for the Court, and three are appointed as Resident Judges and must reside in the county in which they are appointed. No more than a bare majority of the judges may be of one political party; the rest must be of the other major political party.

Appointment: The Governor appoints Superior Court Judges with the consent of the Senate.

Tenure: The judges are appointed for 12-year terms.

Qualifications: The judges must be learned in the law.

Support Personnel

Superior Court may appoint court reporters, law clerks, bailiffs, presentence officers, a secretary for each judge, and other personnel.

An elected Prothonotary for each county serves as Clerk of Superior Court for that county. The Prothonotary is the record keeper for Superior Court, and as such, the Prothonotary is directly involved with the civil court calendar. The office handles the jury list, property liens, registration of law students and attorneys, and is the custodian of costs and fees for the courts and for the Attorney General. Further, the Prothonotary's Office is charged with the security, care and custody of Court's exhibits.

Elected Sheriffs, one per county, also serves Superior Court.

Caseload Trend

Superior Court was able, in FY 1981, to dispose of 86.7% of its criminal cases in New Castle County (85.2% statewide) within 120 days of arrest, the time interval specified by the Chief Justice's Speedy Trial Directive. The Court was able to achieve this rate because the Court controls its own criminal calendar through the Case Scheduling Office and the Criminal Office Judge, and because of the policy in New Castle County of regularly assigning 5 of New Castle County's 8 judges to criminal matters and 3 to civil matters. The total number of criminal cases filed in FY 1981 in Superior Court rose by over 6% from FY 1980 while the number of criminal cases disposed of increased by over 11%. The number of pending cases statewide rose by 0.4%. Superior Court held 307 criminal trials in FY 1981, up from the total of 255 criminal trials held in FY 1980.

However, Superior Court's emphasis on criminal cases has continued to affect its effort to deal with its civil jurisdiction. The Court experienced a 14.4% decline in the number of filings statewide, partially due to the transfer of Adoptions and Terminations jurisdiction to Family Court, and the Court disposed of 12.5% fewer civil cases in FY 1981 than it did in FY 1980 for the same reason. The Court was not able to dispose of as many cases as were filed, and therefore the number of civil cases pending adjudication rose by 2.4% in FY 1981.

FISCAL YEAR 1980 CRIMINAL CASES WORKLOAD EXPLANATORY NOTES

- 1. The unit of count in Superior Court criminal cases is the defendant. A defendant is defined as an individual named in an indictment, so that an individual named in 3 indictments is counted as 3 defendants. An individual with a consecutively-numbered series of informations, appeals, or transfers filed on the same day is counted as one defendant.
- 2. Informations are filed if defendants waive indictment.
- 3. Transfers are defendants brought before the Court of Common Pleas in New Castle County who request jury trials. Since the Court of Common Pleas in Kent and Sussex Counties itself holds jury trials, there are no transfers in those 2 counties.
- 4. Reinstatements represent defendants who have had their cases disposed of who are brought back before Superior Court for one of the following reasons:
 - -Mistrial
 - -Hung Jury
 - -Motion for new trial granted
 - -Guilty plea withdrawn
 - -Lower court appeal reinstated after being dismissed
 - -Conviction overturned by Supreme Court; remanded to Superior Court for new trial
- 5. Severances are defendants indicted on multiple charges whose charges are severed to be tried separately.
- 6. Trial dispositions refer to the number of defendants whose charges were disposed of at a trial, not the number of trials per se. The date of disposition is the trial date, unless the decision is reserved, in which case it is the date when the opinion is handed down.
- 7. A defendant is counted as being disposed of by nolle prosequi only if all charges in an indictment or information or all charges transferred or appealed simultaneously are dropped. For example, if a defendant pleads guilty to one charge in an indictment, and other charges in the same indictment are then nol-prossed, that defendant is considered to have been disposed of by guilty plea on the date of the plea.
- 8. Defendants are not counted as disposed of by nol-pros if the nolle prosequi was filed to an original charge because the defendant entered a guilty plea to a New Information. Since the New Information is a further action in an existing case and is not counted as a separate filing, so also the nol-pros is not the primary disposition.

- 9. Only nol-prosses filed for defendants who were actually brought before Superior Court by indictment, =58= information, appeal, transfer, reinstatement, or severance are counted in the total number of Superior Court dispositions. Nolle prosequis of unindicted defendants are listed separately because such defendants were never formally before the Superior Court.
- 10. Unindicted nolle prosequis are felony or drug defendants who were arrested and were bound over to Superior Court by a lower court either because probable cause was found or because the defendant waived preliminary hearing. The Attorney General then decided not to seek indictment or the grand jury ignored the indictment and a nolle prosequi was filed.
- 11. Remands are defendants who appealed or transferred their cases to Superior Court and had them remanded back to lower court. ADRR's are cases in which an appeal to Superior Court has been dismissed with the record being remanded to the court from which it came. ADRR's and remands do not constitute the dispositions of all appeals that are filed; some are disposed of by trial de novo, plea, or nolle prosequi.
- 12. Other types of dispositions include consolidations and diversions. A consolidation represents a single individual who is indicted separately on different charges but whose charges are consolidated to be tried together. Thus an individual indicted in January and again in February, and who is counted as two filings, who has the charges tried together will receive one trial disposition and one consolidation disposition. Diversions represent those defendants who are charged with driving under the influence and are first time offenders. The defendants elect to enroll in a rehabiliation program and waive their right to a speedy trial. If the individual satisfactorily completes the program and pays all fees, the driving under the influence charge will be nolle prossed.

- 6. "PG-NI" indicates that a defendant pled guilty to a new information always a less serious charge than the original one.
- 7. "PG-Information" denotes a defendant who waived indictment and pled guilty to an information filed by the Attorney General. This is always a reduced charge.
- 8. A plea of nolo contendere is considered to be the equivalent of a guilty plea; e.g., a plea of nolo contendere to an LIO is counted in with the PG-LIO's.



FISCAL YEAR 1981 CRIMINAL CASES PERFORMANCE EXPLANATORY NOTES

- 1. The Speedy Trial Directive of Chief Justice Daniel L. Herrmann states that all criminal defendants brought before Superior Court should be tried within 120 days of arrest.
- 2. The charts measure the average and median time intervals between arrest and disposition, and the average and median time intervals between indictment or information and disposition. Since Superior Court cases do not all originate by indictment, it is not possible to subtract the figures for indictment to disposition from the figures for arrest to disposition to determine preindictment time intervals.
- 3. In measuring the elapsed time of defendants for the purposes of computing compliance with speedy trial directives or average elapsed time, Superior Court excludes the following time intervals:
 - a. For all capiases, the time between the date the capias is issued and the date the capias is executed.
 - b. In the case of capiases issued at arraignment, the interval between the execution of the capias and arraignment.
 - c. In the case of capiases issued at trial, the time between execution of the capias and the first scheduled trial date.
 - d. For all Rule 9 Summonses and Rule 9 Warrants, the time between arrest and indictment, if any.
 - e. In the case of Rule 9 Warrants, the interval between indictment and arrest.
 - f. In the case of Rule 9 Summonses which are superseded by Rule 9 Warrants, the full interval between indictment and arrest.
 - g. For all nolle prosequis, all time between the scheduled trial date and the actual filing date of the nolle prosequi.

- 1. Complaints are suits for damages. The Complaints category includes Complaints for Damages, Condemnations, Ejectments, Appeals from Justice of the Peace Court, Appeals from Arbitration Panel, Declaratory Judgments, Foreign Judgments, Replevins, Foreign Attachments, Domestic Attachments, Interpleaders, Transfers and Removals from the Court of Chancery, and Transfers and Removals from the Court of Common Pleas.
- 2. Mechanic's Liens and Mortgages are property suits.
- 3. Terminations and Adoptions are parental rights cases. On 9/11/80, jurisdiction over these cases was transferred to Family Court. Superior Court continues to hear those Adoptions and Terminations which had already been filed in Superior Court. However, all new cases are filed in Family Court.
- 4. Involuntary Commitments are proceedings held to determine whether individuals shall be involuntarily committed as mentally ill. Because Delaware State Hospital, the state's facility for mentally ill patients, is located in New Castle County, all Involuntary Commitment hearings are held in New Castle County.
- 5. Appeals are appeals on the record. This category includes Appeals from Administrative Agencies, Appeals from Family Court, Appeals from the Court of Common Pleas, and Certioraris.
- 6. Miscellaneous includes all other cases. During FY 1981 this category consisted of Complaints Requesting Order, Habeus Corpus, Mandamus, Writs of Prohibition, Writs of Possession, Petitions for Destruction of Indicia of Arrest, Petitions to Compel Satisfaction of Judgment, Petitions to Extend Judgment, Petitions to Satisfy Mortgage, Petitions to Set Aside Mortgage, Petitions for Writ of Quo Warranto, Petitions to Inspect Records, Petitions to Quash Subpoena, Petitions for Issuance of Subpoena, Petitions for Appointment of Attorney, Out of State Depositions, Petitions to Sell Real Estate for Property Taxes, Petitions for Return of Property, Petitions to Vacate Public Road, Tax Ditches, Libels, Petitions to Set Aside Sheriff's Sales, Petitions for Correction of Birth Certificate, Petitions to Set Aside Satisfaction of Judgment, Motions to Quash Search Warrants, Petitions for Custody Under Detainer Act, Protective Orders, and Petitions for Marriage License.



Law Libraries

There are three Law Libraries located in the State of Delaware, staffed and maintained by state funds and each presided over by a Law Librarian. The libraries are named after the counties in which they are situated.

The primary function of the Law Libraries is to provide a legal information center for the Judiciary, Public Defender's Office, legal representatives of counties and municipalities, city solicitors, and members of the Delaware Bar. They are also the official depositories for state laws, administrative regulations, and court rules. The libraries are made available to registered law students to assist them in preparation for state bar examinations and in their legal education. All three libraries are designated as official depository libraries by the U.S. Government Printing Office. As state-supported agencies, the libraries are available to the general public during normal working hours. Aid and assistance is rendered to persons wishing to make use of the

The New Castle County Law Library, located in the Public Building, Wilmington, Delaware, is the busiest of the three libraries. It houses in excess of 25,000 books and there is presently seated working space for about 26 persons at one time. The addition of a microfiche reader printer to the New Castle County Law Library has proven to be a valuable one. The facility is maintained and administered by a full-time Law Librarian and a part-time Library Assistant. The Kent County Law Library, due to its location, is designated as the State Library. It houses the largest legal library maintained by the state with about 35,000 volumes and is staffed by one full-time librarian and one part-time assistant. The Sussex County Law Library is staffed by one Law Librarian and houses over 13,000 volumes.

All three libraries are currently in need of space for expansion due to the growing number of volumes. In addition, the Kent and Sussex Libraries have recently experienced physical problems - leaking roofs in Kent and structural difficulties in Sussex.

The Law Libraries are responsible for administrative library work as well as maintaining the bookkeeping records required by the State. These duties and responsibilities include but are not limited to the following: insertion of pocket parts, maintenance of loose leaf service bookkeeping for the agency's accounts, preparing invoices for library expenditures, filing and indexing reported and unreported opinions from the several courts, obtaining and filing copies of rules and regulations promulgated by the governmental agencies, maintaining of books and their monetary values, obtaining and filing statutes from the Legislative Council and other states, handling requests from various persons for information contained in the library, handling special requests for research work from the judges, planning and recommending development and improvement of services, writing reports, and performing other duties associated with library work.

Family Court

Legal Authorization

The Family Court Act, Title 10, Chapter 9, Delaware Code, authorizes the Family Court.

Geographic Organization

The Family Court is a unified statewide Court with branches in New Castle County at Wilmington, Kent County at Dover, and Sussex County at Georgetown,

Legal Jurisdiction

The Family Court has had conferred upon it by the General Assembly jurisdiction over juvenile delinquency, child neglect, dependency, and abuse, adult misdemeanor crimes against juveniles, child and spouse support, paternity of children, custody and visitation of children, divorces and annulments, property divisions, specific enforcement of separation agreements, guardianship over minors, interference with family relationships, and intrafamily misdemeanor crimes. Additionally, Family Court gained jurisdiction over terminations of parental rights and adoptions on 9/9/80. Adoptions and terminations filed in Superior Court prior to that date will be disposed of in Superior Court.

The Family Court does not have jurisdiction over adults charged with felonies or juveniles charged with first degree murder, rape, or kidnapping.

Appeals are made on the record to Superior Court, except divorce and support cases, which are appealed directly to the Supreme Court.

Judges

Number: The Court is composed of 12 judges of equal judicial authority, one of whom is Chief Judge, who is the chief administrative and executive officer for the Court. Half of the judges must be of one major political party and half of the other major political party.

Appointment: The Governor appoints the judges with the consent of the Senate.

Tenure: The judges are appointed for 12-year terms.

Qualifications: Judges must have been duly admitted to the practice of law before the Supreme Court of Delaware at least 5 years prior to appointment and must have a knowledge of the law and interest in and understanding of family and child problems. They shall not practice law during their tenure and may be reappointed.

Other Judicial Personnel

The Chief Judge appoints and commissions masters for the Court who shall hold office at his pleasure and must have resided in the State for at least 5 years prior to their appointment. Masters may hear any matters properly before them, and their decisions become judgments of the Court unless disapproved by a judge. Parties may request a review de novo by a judge, by petitioning in writing within 15 days of the master's decision.

Support Personnel

The 3 major administrative divisions of the Court are: Court Operations, Fiscal Services, and Personnel Services. Fiscal Services and Personnel Services perform staff functions, whereas Court Operations is responsible for the delivery of services to the public.

The Family Court has a staff of more than 210 persons in addition to the judiciary. The staff includes clerks of court, judicial secretaries, counselors, accounting personnel, clerks, clerk-typists, bailiffs, process servers, and hearing officers in mediation and arbitration cases, as well as volunteers working in all areas of the Court.

Caseload Trend

Filings in Family Court rose by 11.0% in FY 1981, from 27,625 in FY 1980 to 30,654 in FY 1981. Dispositions increased by 4,457, or 17.1%, from 26,082 in FY 1980 to 30,539 in FY 1981.

The filings that were pending increased from 6,382 at the end of FY 1980 to 6,497 at the end of FY 1981, a 1.8% increase. Adult criminal pending increased by 14.3%, juvenile delinquency cases pending decreased by 1.6%, and civil cases pending rose by 2.7%.



Court of Common Pleas

Legal Authorization

The statewide Court of Common Pleas was created by 10 Delaware Code, Chapters 13, 15, and 16, effective July 5, 1973.

Geographic Organization

The Court of Common Pleas sits in each of the three counties at the respective county seats.

Legal Jurisdiction

The Court of Common Pleas has statewide jurisdiction which includes concurrent jurisdiction with Superior Court in civil actions where the amount involved, exclusive of interest, does not exceed \$5,000 on the complaint. There is no limitation in amount on counterclaim. All civil cases are tried without a jury.

The Court has criminal jurisdiction over all misdemeanors occurring in the State of Delaware except drug-related cases (other than possession of marijuana), and those occurring within the corporate limits of the City of Wilmington. It also is responsible for all preliminary hearings. Jury trial is available to all defendants but in New Castle County jury trials are referred to Superior Court for disposition.

Judges

There are five Judges of the Court of Common Pleas, one Chief Judge and four Resident Judges. The Judges are appointed by the Governor with the consent of the Senate for 12 year terms and must have been actively engaged in the general practice of law in the State of Delaware for at least five years and must be citizens of the State. No more than a majority of one judge may be from the same political party.

Support Personnel

Personnel are appointed by the Chief Judge of the Court of Common Pleas, and consist of a Court Administrator (Chief Clerk), one Chief Deputy Clerk for each county, and such other employees as are necessary, including Bailiffs, Court Reporters, Secretaries, Clerks, Presentence Officers, etc.

Caseload Trend

The number of criminal and civil cases filed in the Court of Common Pleas rose again in FY 1981. Criminal case filings rose in all three counties, increasing by over 10% in each county with a statewide increase of 12.3%. The statewide increase in FY 1980 was 28.6%. Dispositions of criminal cases in FY 1981 also rose by over 10% in each of the counties with a statewide increase of 14.6%, which compared with the 23.7% statewide increase in FY 1980. Despite the increase in dispositions, the large number of filings led to a 14.3% increase in criminal

cases pending during the year. In contrast, there was a decrease in the number of civil case filings, with the State showing a reduction of 3.3%. This is a change from the 8.8% increase in FY 1980. It should be noted that civil cases filed have become more complicated and there has been a tremendous increase in the use of motion practice and discovery procedures. While this delays disposition in a number of cases, it is felt that the disposal of more complicated cases better serves the whole judicial system in the general movement of civil cases. The number of civil cases disposed of in FY 1980 fell by 13.5%, which was a major reason why there was a 21.8% increase in civil cases pending at year's end.



Municipal Court

Legal Authorization

The Municipal Court of the City of Wilmington is authorized by 10 Delaware Code, Section 1701.

Geographic Organization

The Court has jurisdiction within the geographic boundaries of Wilmington.

Legal Jurisdiction

Municipal Court has criminal jurisdiction over traffic, misdemeanor, and municipal ordinances concurrent with the Justices of the Peace and the Court of Common Pleas. The Court conducts preliminary hearings for both felonies and drug-related misdemeanors. Jury trials are not available. The Court has a Violations Division which processes all moving and parking citations.

Judges

Number - There are 3 Judges of the Municipal Court of Wilmington; not more than 2 of the Judges may be members of the same political party.

Appointment - The Judges are appointed by the Governor, with the approval by the Senate.

Tenure - Judges are appointed for 12-year terms.

Qualifications - The Judges must be licensed to practice law in the State of Delaware for 5 years preceding appointment.

Support Personnel

The Chief Judge of the Municipal Court appoints a Chief Clerk who may in turn appoint Deputies.

Caseload Trend

There were 8,761 criminal cases filed in the Municipal Court during FY 1981, 202 more than the 8,559 criminal filings from FY 1980. The increase in criminal filings represented a percentage change of +2.4%. Similarly, the 8,649 criminal dispositions in FY 1981 was an increase of 227 dispositions from the 8,422 criminal dispositions in FY 1980. The percentage increase in criminal dispositions from FY 1980 to FY 1981 was +2.7%.

During FY 1981 there were 11,777 traffic filings, far less than the 14,785 traffic filings in FY 1980. The decrease of 3,008 filings represented a decrease of 20.3% in traffic filings between FY 1980 and FY 1981. There was also a decrease of 2,336 traffic dispositions, dropping from 14,493 in FY 1980 to 12,157 in FY 1981. This was a decrease of 16.1% from the previous fiscal year. Traffic filings and dispositions were at their lowest levels since FY 1977.

With the decrease in total filings in FY 1981, and the smaller decrease in total dispositions in FY 1981, the result was an overall decrease in pending cases at the end of the fiscal year. Criminal pending rose by 16.6% but traffic pending declined by 33.8%, with the decrease in total pending being 14.9%, a decline from 1,800 at the beginning to 1,532 at the end of the fiscal year.





Justice of the Peace Courts

Legal Authorization

The Justice of the Peace Courts are authorized by the Constitution of Delaware, Article IV, Section I.

Geographic Organization

The jurisdiction of the Courts is statewide and sessions are held throughout the State. 19 Courts are currently operating, 8 in New Castle County, 4 in Kent County, and 7 in Sussex County.

Legal Jurisdiction

The Justice of the Peace Courts have jurisdiction over civil cases in which the amount in controversy does not exceed \$1,500. JP Courts are authorized to hear certain misdemeanors and most motor vehicle cases (excluding felonies) and may act as committing magistrates for all crimes. Since Justice of the Peace Courts are not courts of record, appeals may be taken de novo to Superior Court. The subject matter jurisdiction of the Justice of the Peace Courts is shared with the Court of Common Pleas.

Justices of the Peace

The Delaware Code authorizes a maximum of 53 Justices of the Peace, 24 in New Castle County, 12 in Kent County, and 17 in Sussex County. Magistrates are appointed by the Governor with Senate confirmation for four-year terms. A Justice of the Peace must be at least 21 years of age and a resident of the State of Delaware and the county in Senate confirmation.

Support Personnel

An Administrator and a pair of administrative officers help the Chief Magistrate direct the JP Courts on a day-to-day basis. The State provides chief clerks, deputy clerks, constables, bailiffs, and presentence officers


Caseload Trend

The total number of cases filed in the JP Courts during FY 1981 was 151,273, nearly 2,000 above the total in FY 1980. This number of filings was a new high for a single fiscal year in the JP Courts.

Criminal cases rose in FY 1981 to a new high of 131,227 filings, slightly more than the 130,541 criminal filings in FY 1980. Criminal dispositions rose by 1.3% to a new high of 131,610 in FY 1981.

The number of civil cases filed rose by 5.4% in FY 1981 to 20,046 (an all-time high) from the FY 1980 total of 19,028. The number of civil cases pending increased by 10.5% during FY 1981 from 14,412 at the beginning of the fiscal year to 15,931 at the end of FY 1981. The reason for this increase was the drop in civil dispositions from 19,382 in FY 1980 to 18,509 in FY 1981, a decline of 4.5%.







Alderman's Courts

Legal Authorization

Alderman's Courts are authorized by the town charters of their respective towns.

Geographic Organization

Alderman's Courts have jurisdiction within their own town limits only. There are 13 Alderman's Courts currently active with the Alderman's Court in Delmar closing at the end of FY 1980. When a town is without a court or an alderman for any period of time, its cases are transferred to the nearest Justice of the Peace Court.

Legal Jurisdiction

The jurisdiction of an Alderman's Court is limited to minor misdemeanors, traffic offenses, parking violations, and minor civil matters. The specific jurisdiction of each court again varies with the town charter (which is approved by the State Legislature). Many courts handle only traffic and parking violations; only 6 handle as many as 100 criminal cases annually. Harrington's court handles only civil cases. Appeals are taken de novo to Superior Court within 15 days of the trial.


Aldermen

The selection, number, tenure, and qualifications of aldermen are determined by the towns themselves. Some require lawyers; others choose ordinary citizens. A few aldermen serve full-time, but most are part-time judges. In New Castle, the mayor serves as judge of their court.

Caseload Trend

FY 1981 was the fifth year during which complete workload statistics were collected. 6 of the 13 active courts experienced workload increases while 7 of the courts declined in workload. Overall, the total number of cases heard by aldermen in Delaware rose by 493, a 2.9% increase, to an all-time high of 17,702 cases. Most Sussex County courts continue to have extremely seasonal fluctuations in their caseloads.



Violent Crimes Compensation Board

Legal Authorization

The Violent Crimes Compensation Board is authorized by 11 Delaware Code, Chapter 90.

Purpose

It is the purpose of the Violent Crimes Compensation Board to "promote the public welfare by establishing a means of meeting the additional hardships imposed upon the innocent victims of certain crimes, and the family and dependents of those victims". Thus, compensation to help meet the added burdens which sometimes face the innocent victims of certain crimes may be offered by the Board for as much as \$10,000. The Board receives a 10% penalty assessment which by law is added onto every fine, penalty, and forfeiture. These monies are deposited into the "Victim's Compensation Fund" for use when needed.

Geographic Organization

The Board is responsible for handling requests for compensation throughout the State of Delaware. Hearings on these requests are held in either Wilmington or Dover, with the Administrative Office of the Violent Crimes Compensation Board located in Wilmington.

Personnel

The Violent Crimes Compensation Board consists of five members: a chairman, a vice-chairman, and three additional Board members. Each member is appointed by the Governor and must be approved by the Senate before serving on the Board. The term of each Board member is three years as long as no more than two Board members have their terms expire at the end of any given year. The Board must be composed of three members of one of the major political parties and two members from the other major political party. The Board may appoint an Executive Secretary and other employees as needed up to a maximum of five at one time. In addition to the Executive Secretary, the Board currently employs an administrative assistant, two claim investigators, and a secretary.

Caseload Trend

A total of \$298,534.92 was awarded for payment of expenditures to victims, attorneys, and medical opinions. This was the largest amount awarded in any fiscal year to date by the Board for such payments, an increase of 18.5% from the \$251,873.36 awarded in fiscal year 1980. Over the entire history of the Board, approximately two-thirds of all expenditures for any given fiscal year were for victims, attorneys, and medical opinions while the remaining one-third was for administrative costs. Through the end of FY 1981, the Board has awarded approximately \$1,230,800.00 for victims, attorneys, and medical opinions.

Foster Care Review Board

Legal Authorization

The Foster Care Review Board is authorized by 31 Delaware Code, Chapter 38.

Purpose

The Board serves as an independent monitoring system responsible for identifying and periodically reviewing children placed in foster care. Reviews of individual children in placement are conducted to ensure that continuing efforts are being made to obtain permanent homes for these children. The Board must report annually to the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, the General Assembly and the Governor upon the effectiveness of its activities and must submit recommendations regarding the policies and procedures of foster care placement agencies.

Geographic Organization

The Board is responsible for reviewing the placements of children throughout the State of Delaware and actual review sessions are conducted in various locations across the State. The Administrative Office of the Board is located in Wilmington.

Personnel

21 citizen volunteers compose the Foster Care Review Board. Members are appointed by the Governor and serve either a two or three year term. Of the 21 Board members, not more than 11 may be members of either major political party. The Governor designates one member who serves at his pleasure as Chairman. The Board hires an Administrative Coordinator who may in turn employ additional support personnel.

Caseload Trend

The Board's enacting legislation called for the first reviewing of foster placements to begin in July of 1980. In preparation for this start-up date, the Board identified the foster child population and selected a representative sample for review. 340 reviews of the Board's allotted 400 were scheduled. A 3-month start-up period of below maximum scheduling accounts for the reduced number of scheduled reviews. During the Board's second full program year, a minimum of 385 reviews will be scheduled.

Documented first year exits show the remarkable initial success of the Board's review program. Though the original sample of children selected for review made up only 27% of the State's foster child population, sampled children accounted for 40% of the documented exits from foster care. 10.4% of the unsampled children exiting from care were placed for adoption while 20.2% of the sampled children exited from foster care for this reason.

Return to parents for both sampled and unsampled children ran above 45% (45.5% and 48.3% respectively) for all children exiting as the reason for leaving foster care. For the sampled children, however, the ratio of whites to other races returning home was almost one to one. Among the unsampled children, the ratio was nearly two to one.

An analysis of the status of all children in foster care is unavailable due to continued discrepancies in the Quarterly Reports submitted by the Division of Social Services.

Conferences & Councils

COURT ON THE JUDICIARY

Article IV, Section 37 of the Constitution of the State of Delaware created this Court, consisting of the Chief Justice and the Associate Justices of the Supreme Court, the Chancellor, and the President Judge of Superior Court.

Any judicial officer appointed by the Governor may be censured, removed, or retired by the Court on the Judiciary for willful misconduct in office, willful and persistent failure to perform duties, commission of an offense involving moral turpitude, other misconduct in violation of the Canons of Judicial Ethics, or permanent mental or physical disability interfering with the proper performance of these duties.

No censure, removal, or retirement can be effective until the judicial officer has been served with written charges and has had the opportunity to be heard in accordance with due process of law.

The Court on the Judiciary has the power to:

- (a) summon witnesses to appear and testify under oath and to compel production of other evidence, and
- (b) adopt rules establishing procedures for the investigation and trial of a judicial officer.

JUDICIAL CONFERENCE

Legal Authorization

The Judicial Conference is authorized by Supreme Court Rule 35.

Duties

The Judicial Conference studies the judicial business of the courts with a view towards improving the administration of justice in the State. The Conference also considers improvements in procedure, considers and recommends legislation, considers and implements the Canons of Judicial Ethics, and holds symposia of the Bench and Bar.

Membership

The membership of the Conference includes the judges of the Supreme Court, Court of Chancery, Superior Court, Family Court, Court of Common Pleas, and the Municipal Court of Wilmington. The Chief Justice is presiding officer of the Conference. The Director of the Administrative Office of the Courts serves as secretary for the Conference. Scheduled meetings of the Conference are held on the first Wednesdays of December and June.

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COUNCIL ON THE ADMINISTRATION OF JUSTICE

Legal Authorization

The Council on the Administration of Justice is authorized by 10 Delaware Code. § 2001-2008.

Duties

The Council is charged with the continuous study of the administration of justice in the State, and of the organization, procedure, practice, rules, and methods of administration and operation of each and all the courts of the State, whether of record or not of record. The Council collects and uses statistical and other information concerning the work of the courts and makes recommendations to the Governor, the General Assembly, the courts, and/or the bar.

Membership

There are 15 members including the Chief Justice, the Chancellor, the President Judge of Superior Court, the Speaker of the House, the President Pro Tem of the Senate, the Minority Leaders of the House and Senate, the Attorney General, the President of the Bar Association, the President of the University of Delaware, and five non-lawyers appointed by the Governor for a term coextensive with that of the appointing Governor. Projects Supported by Federal Funds

During 1981, Delaware courts received continued federal support in the effort to improve the criminal justice system from the Delaware Criminal Justice Planning Commission (DCJPC), which is the state criminal justice planning agency that administers the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration (LEAA) block grant allocation. LEAA block grant funding has been abolished and the Delaware courts no longer receive grant assistance.

LEAA block grant funds were expended for the following purposes:

- 1. To provide computer terminals for the courts. LEAA funds enabled the courts to rent 5 computer terminals for the courts, 3 in Superior Court, 1 in Family Court, and 1 in the Justice of the Peace Courts. The terminals enabled these courts to access computerized criminal histories to aid the courts in bail and sentencing decisions. The criminal histories are housed in the state's main Central Data Processing computer in Dover. The terminals in Superior Court and the JP Courts were also used to perform the functions of the Courts' own information system. All grants for computer terminals ended on 6/30/81.
- 2. To provide planning assistance to the Administrative Office of the Courts. The Administrative Office of the Courts received funds to employ a professional planning staff. A research assistant and a secretary were employed with these funds. They prepared statistics and performed other administrative and planning functions as directed by the Administrative Office of the Courts. This grant ended on 6/30/81.
- 3. To expand the Superior Court Case Scheduling Office. This subgrant funded a Data Entry/Calendaring Clerk to assist the Case Scheduling Office in Superior Court, New Castle County, particularly in entering data for the computerized information system. This grant ended on 10/15/81.
- 4. To establish an Arbitration Hearing Unit. This subgrant aided Family Court in continuing an Arbitration Unit. Federal funds added a hearing officer, 2 interview officers, and a clerk typist to 3 state-funded personnel (a hearing officer and 2 interview officers). The Arbitration Unit sought to provide an arbitration mechanism for those first and second time offender juveniles and adults charged with misdemeanors, in order to divert defendants from further court involvement while still satisfying complainants and victims. The grant ended on 9/30/80.
- 5. To provide new recording equipment for Family Court. This 2nd-year grant of \$16,500 ran from 9/1/80 through 6/30/81 and enabled Family Court to replace the balance of its outmoded electronic recording system. Grant funds purchased 4 recording units, 3 transcription machines, and a high-speed duplicator.
- 6. To staff the judiciary's computer center. This subgrant funded a Data Processing Manager and an additional computer operator. The Data Processing Manager provided the proper level of supervision and management to the computer center and the court computerization project. The second computer operator enabled the computer center to operate two shifts per day on weekdays. This grant ended on 12/15/80.

LEAA also awarded three discretionary grants to the Delaware courts directly from Washington. These programs were as follows:

7. Comprehensive Data Systems (CDS)

A part-time systems analyst was assigned to work with the Courts in the development of the courts' module of the overall criminal justice information system. The analyst designed the Court of Common Pleas' portion of the system before the grant terminated on 12/15/80.

8. State Judicial Information System (SJIS), Phase II

This LEAA continuation grant of \$161,000 was awarded to the Administrative Office of the Courts on 8/9/79 and ran till 5/8/81. The funding was provided to allow the AOC to hire a team of contract programmers to do data base design, program specifications, programming, and documentation for Superior Court, Family Court, and Court of Common Pleas criminal and juvenile delinquency cases. All tasks were completed by grant's end.

9. Restitution Project

The Family Court "Restitution by Juvenile Offenders Project" was a two-year LEAA grant for over \$800,000. It became operational on 3/1/79 and ended on 6/30/81. In this project, adjudicated juvenile offenders make monetary payment to the victim, provide direct service to the victim, or engage in community service. Each project juvenile is under the supervision of a project counselor in the court.

Legislation

The following court-related legislation was enacted during 1981 by the Delaware General Assembly.

SENATE

Senate Bill 2

Sponsors, Senators Charles E. Hughes and Angelo T. Citro Signed by the Governor 5/26/81

This bill reclassifies tampering with a witness from a Class A misdemeanor to a Class D felony and clarifies the definitions thereof.

Senate Bill 101

Sponsor, Senator Richard S. Cordrey Signed by the Governor 6/30/81

This bill allows Family Court to accept voluntary assignment of wages from a defendant who violates a support order in lieu of a wage attachment. Support checks may be payable as directed by the Court rather than only to Family Court as per the previous statute. The bill also makes employers who have received proper notice of wage attachment orders liable for payment if they fail to comply with the terms of the wage assignment.

Senate Bill 172

Sponsors, Senators Richard S. Cordrey, Thurman G. Adams, Jr., and W. Lee Littleton and Representatives John M. Burris, Harry E. Derrickson, B. Bradford Barnes, Evelyn K. Fallon, Carrol W. Cordrey, and Charles P. West Signed by the Governor 7/9/81

This bill removes from the Superior Court Judges the authority to set salaries for Chief Deputy Prothonotaries and places that authority in the County Councils or Levy Court.

Senate Bill 208

Sponsors, Senator Harris B. McDowell, III, and Representative Thomas E. Brady, Jr. Enacted 7/7/81

This bill is the second leg of a constitutional amendment which allows retired Superior Court Judges, Chancellors and Vice-Chancellors of the Court of Chancery, and Supreme Court Justices to temporarily return to the bench under certain conditions, upon designation of the Chief Justice.

Senate Bill 223

Sponsor, Senator Thurman G. Adams, Jr. Signed by the Governor 7/9/81

This bill allows the Sussex County Council, rather than the state code, to establish fees for the Register of Wills in Sussex County.

Senate Bill 238

Sponsors, Senators Thomas B. Sharp, Harris B. McDowell, III, Jacob W. Zimmerman, James T. Vaughn, Sr., Charles E. Hughes, and Angelo T. Citro and Representative Robert W. Riddagh Signed by the Governor 6/30/81

This bill clarifies the definition of "family" in the Family Court Act so as to indicate clearly which offenses are under the jurisdiction of Family Court.

Senate Bill 241

Sponsors, Senators Thomas B. Sharp, Harris B. McDowell, III, Jacob W. Zimmerman, James T. Vaughn, Sr., Charles E. Hughes, and Angelo T. Citro and Representative Robert W. Riddagh Signed by the Governor 6/30/81

This bill requires that a preliminary injunction shall be issued, upon the filing of a divorce petition, against both parties to the action, enjoining them from transferring or disposing of any property (except for necessities), disturbing the other party, removing children from Delaware, or incurring any debt (again, except for necessities).

Senate Bill 246

Sponsors, Senators Thomas B. Sharp, Harris B. McDowell, III, Jacob W. Zimmerman, James T. Vaughn, Sr., Charles E. Hughes, and Angelo T. Citro and Representative Robert W. Riddagh Signed by the Governor 6/30/81

This law allows Family Court to appoint bailiffs who have the power of peace officers, including arrest powers, to deal with unruly individuals in court. Superior Court bailiffs already have such powers.

Senate Bill 247

Sponsors, Senators Thomas B. Sharp, Harris B. McDowell, III, Jacob W. Zimmerman, James T. Vaughn, Sr., Charles E. Hughes, and Angelo T. Citro and Representative Robert W. Riddagh Signed by the Governor 7/9/81

This bill gives Family Court concurrent authority with the Court of Chancery to appoint guardians over minors under 18 years of age.

Senate Bill 270

Sponsors, Senators Thomas B. Sharp, Angelo T. Citro, Harris B. McDowell, III, Jacob W. Zimmerman, James T. Vaughn, Sr., and Charles E. Hughes and Representatives William A. Oberle, Jr., Michael J. Harrington, Richard C. Cathcart, Jeffrey G. Mack, Terry R. Spence, Ruth Ann Minner, and Casimir S. Jonkiert
Signed by the Governor 7/9/81

This bill establishes the new offenses of drug trafficking and provides enhanced penalties for them.

Senate Bill 283

Sponsors, Senators Thomas B. Sharp, Harris B. McDowell, III, Jacob W. Zimmerman, James T. Vaughn, Sr., Charles E. Hughes, and Angelo T. Citro and Representative Robert W. Riddagh Signed by the Governor 7/7/81

This bill allows a party in any civil action in Family Court to obtain personal jurisdiction over another party by personal service, mail, leaving summons at the party's residence, or in any manner prescribed by the Court.

Senate Bill 291

Sponsors, Senators James T. Vaughn, Sr., Thomas B. Sharp, Nancy W. Cook, Charles E. Hughes, and Angelo T. Citro and Representatives Robert W. Riddagh, Terry R. Spence, Jeffrey G. Mack, Casimir S. Jonkiert, and Ruth Ann Minner Signed by the Governor 7/13/81

This bill requires that any offender convicted of stealing or destroying property shall be ordered by the Court to make restitution, unless the reason is stated on the record. The Court determines the nature and amount of restitution based on a loss statement prepared by the police, or by the victim if there is no police involvement. If an offender is ordered to pay fines and costs along with restitution, the order of payment must be victim compensation fund first, restitution second, and then other payments.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

House Bill 116

Sponsors, Representatives William A. Oberle, Jr., and James F. Edwards Signed by the Governor 7/7/81

This bill clarifies standards of admissibility of evidence when a chemical test of a person's blood, breath, or urine for alcohol is used in a trial for traffic violations.

House Bill 120

Sponsors, Representatives William A. Oberle, Jr., James F. Edwards, Terry R. Spence, and Philip J. Corrozi and Senator Thomas B. Sharp
Signed by the Governor 7/7/81

This bill requires Family Court to order the Motor Vehicle Division to revoke or suspend the license of any juvenile convicted of driving under the influence until he or she reaches the age of 20. Such revocation or suspension may not be waived for at least 6 months and then only if the juvenile completes a rehabilitation course and demonstrates a critical need for the license.

House Bill 132

Sponsors, Representatives Robert W. Riddagh, Michael J. Harrington, Robert S. Powell, and Gerard A. Cain and Senators Robert T. Connor, William M. Murphy, Jr., and Jacob W. Zimmerman Signed by the Governor 6/30/81

This bill repealed various sections of the Delaware Code which have been superseded by the recently adopted Uniform Rules of Evidence.

House Bill 147

Sponsors, Representatives Robert W. Riddagh, Michael J. Harrington, Robert S. Powell, and Gerard A. Cain and Senators Robert T. Connor, William M. Murphy, Jr., and Jacob W. Zimmerman Signed by the Governor 6/30/81

This bill adopts the Uniform Declaratory Judgments Act.

House Bill 152

Sponsors, Representatives William A. Oberle, Jr., Richard Sincock, Terry R. Spence, and Michael J. Harrington Signed by the Governor 7/7/81

This act allows the Court of Chancery to authorize guardianships over the property of persons who own property in Delaware but do not reside here.

House Bill 215

Sponsor, Representative Casimir S. Jonkiert Signed by the Governor 7/14/81

This bill permits Prothonotaries to invest money they are holding for costs or fees in short-term certificates of deposit to yield greater interest.

House Bill 243

Sponsors, Representatives Robert W. Riddagh and Senator James T. Vaughn, Sr. Signed by the Governor 7/7/81

This bill removes jurisdiction over the felonies of sexual misconduct and promoting prostitution in the first degree from Family Court to Superior Court.

House Bill 330

Sponsors, Representatives Richard C. Cathcart, Gerard A. Cain, Jeffrey G. Mack, Kevin W. Free, William A. Oberle, Jr., Robert F. Gilligan, and Casimir S. Jonkiert and Senators Herman M. Holloway, Sr., Andrew G. Knox, and Harris B. McDowell, III

Signed by the Governor 7/7/81

This bill provides that the Sheriff of New Castle County receives a salary set by County ordinance and shall not receive any fees, costs, or allowances paid to or collected by him for any official service carried out by him as Sheriff.
